here are stories, of course—stories that circulate, stories that shift and fragment with each telling, and as a home to stories, the tales of our own origins are themselves kaleidoscopic. Amidst the details of the room, the names, and the reasons that Cúirt was founded 40 years ago, there are some unmoving details. Cúirt was founded in 1985, and was initially held as a three-day international poetry festival in Galway. It has since evolved into a week-long programme of events celebrating a mix of literary arts across the city's favourite venues. With readings, lectures, discussions, launches, and workshops, Cúirt has welcomed thousands of guests, as well as Irish and international writers of exceptional talent. The festival, since its conception, has ushered in 40 Galway springs with a celebration of literature.

In those 40 years, the magic of Cúirt has been found in the warmly remembered moments that make up our own stories. The hushed conversations in the corners of a crowded room, a chance encounter with a stranger's words, the thrum of connection that hangs in the air long after the last speaker has left the stage.

With the history of Cúirt only as rich as the lives that wander in and out each April, this year, to mark its 40th anniversary, we invite you to continue to tell the story with us. We're celebrating 40 years of Cúirt with special archival projects and programming.

And don't miss *Capturing Cúirt: 40 Years of Stories*, where you can come, share—and hear—all the scandalous, the mischievous, and the heartwarming tales, to celebrate you, our audience.

Whether this is your first Cúirt, or you've been to every one, we hope to see you every April for years to come.

## The Opening Chapter: Paul Muldoon and Sally Rooney



Hotel Lux is Irish historian Maurice J. Casey's debut. An exploration of Irish and queer history with a keen interest in how twentieth century revolutionaries navigated day-to-day life.

Maurice follows Irish radical May O'Callaghan and a group of revolutionaries in 1920s Moscow, who were brought together by their vision for a communist future. Join us as he delves into the multi-generational story of a group of forgotten communist activists culminating in a queer love story. The illuminating history of *Hotel Lux* looks as much into the past as it does into the future.



#### <u>Sally Rooney and John Patrick McHugh</u> <u>in Conversation</u>

Sally Rooney, one of the most defining voices in contemporary literature, is known for her precise, emotionally charged prose and her ability to capture the push and pull of modern relationships. From Conversations with Friends to last year's Intermezzo, her novels trace the fault lines between intellect and feeling, between self-sufficiency and the longing to be understood. Her characters orbit one another—drawn in, repelled, circling back—while Rooney's cool, meticulous narration lays bare their inner lives with an almost surgical clarity.

John Patrick McHugh, hailed for his evocative and deeply atmospheric storytelling, writes with a lyricism that feels both raw and restrained. His debut short story collection, *Pure Gold*, captures the restlessness of small-town Irish life—young men and women trapped between longing and inertia, searching for meaning in places that seem to resist it. His debut novel *Fun and Games* builds on these themes, turning its gaze towards the fluidity of memory, the weight of the past, and the complicated ways people hurt and need each other.

A former Laureate na nÓg (2020–2023), she is a vital voice in contemporary Irish-language literature.

Moya Roddy has published poetry, novels and short stories and writes for film and television. Now with *The Dark Art of Darning*, her second poetry collection, she continues exploring themes of family life and the intricate layers of nostalgia and loss.


## Folding Rock: A New Welsh Literary Journal

Dane Holt's debut collection, *Father's Father's Father*, scrutinises contemporary masculinity, community, and the legacy of grief both



personal and communal, while maintaining a sense of the humorous and absurd.

Gustav Parker Hibbett published their first collection in the summer of 2024. *High Jump as Icarus Story* draws from personal experience and myth alike, deconstructing notions of identity and crafting their own mythology while casting a new light on recognisable figures.



His sharp wit, incisive social commentary, and deeply human stories have made him a household name, both in Ireland and around the world. He has written

novels for adults and children, short stories, plays, screenplays and memoirs, and has won numerous prizes including the PEN Ireland Award and the Booker Prize for *Paddy Clarke Ha Ha Ha*.

Last year's *The Women Behind the Door* returns to Paula Spencer, his beloved character from *The Woman Who Walked Into Doors*, for a story of mother and daughter untangling the ghosts of the past.



The collection also fuses mythic with






Her poems range from the droll to the despairing, with a unique ability to uncover joy in even the darkest moments. From yearning to become a Hungarian Vizsla to exploring planetary fractures, Toutoungi's work blends wit, warmth, and solace in equal measure.



Charles Lang's debut collection, *The Oasis*, pulses with the energy of urban life, offering an unflinching exploration of identity, masculinity, class, and community. His poems move effortlessly from moments of gritty urban chaos to tender reflections, capturing beauty in both the mundane and the extraordinary.

Kevin Barry, known for his deep sense of place and voice, presents *The Heart in Winter*, his highly anticipated 'western with a Cork accent'. Set in the 1890s American West, this atmospheric tale of romantic runaways combines gothic undertones with an epic feel. Described as 'terse and acrobatic' the novel is a masterful blend of beauty, humour, and adventure.







Founded by Mary O'Malley in 1957, and published in Belfast, the journal provided an outlet for leading and emerging writers across poetry and fiction, as well as topical essays, reviews, and criticism for over forty years. Its final issue was published in 1990. Contributors and guest editors included Seamus Heaney, Mary Beckett, Kate O'Brien, Gerald Dawe, John Hewitt, John Montague, and many others. The *Threshold* journal archive lies within the wider Lyric Theatre/O'Malley archive at University of Galway Library, where the journal and selected archival documents have been recently digitised and made available online.

In this online taster workshop you'll be getting to grips with some of the core elements needed to write original and compelling creative nonfiction. Through a combination of group discussion and short writing tasks, you'll look at what it means to take a creative approach to writing about real-world subjects, and learn some of the skills and techniques that others have brought to this exciting and diverse genre. Exercises will be open and exploratory - you'll experiment with voice and form, playing with contrast and scale to bring an original perspective to the subjects that interest you. Borrowing a technique from Maggie Nelson, we'll be writing in concentric circles; we'll willingly follow tangents as we experiment with research methods, and ask how to write characters that are as real on the page as the stories they inhabit. Working from an essay by Michael Malay, we'll also consider how personal narratives can function within works of creative nonfiction – how we might write about landscapes even as we hone in on close-up, sensory details. By the end of the session, you should have gained some new tools to help you approach your material in fresh and novel ways.

The Bank of Ireland Theatre is located between the O'Donoghue centre and Sult, and accessible through the O'Donoghue Centre.

### Charlie Byrne's Bookshop

The Cornstore entrances are step free but have limited wheelchair access due to the width of the doors. The venue has internal steps with limited space to navigate with certain mobility aids. The street entrance has a step. There is one accessible parking space on Middle Street immediately outside, and three spaces on Saint Augustine Street. There are no accessible public bathrooms. There is no Loop system.

### **Galway University Hospital**

Step free venue with accessible bathroom available. Accessible parking available on the hospital grounds. There is no Loop system.

### University of Galway Library

Step free venue with accessible toilet facilities. Accessible parking is located on campus in front of the Quadrangle Building four minutes from the venue. There is no Loop system.

### Kenny's Bookshop

The entrances are step free and wheelchair accessible. The venue has internal steps with limited space to navigate with certain mobility aids. Accessible parking spaces located in front of the building. There is no Loop system.

### The Cornstore

Step free venue. Accessible parking located in Augustine Street and Middle Street. There are no accessible public bathrooms. There is no Loop system.


### Alice Rekab: Clann Miotlantach / Mythlantics

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

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
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
