




FESTIVAL CLUB: MAGUIRE & McBRIDE 10:30 pm

FESTIVAL EXHIBITION "Place of the Three Stones"

Paintings and poems of Ballintrillick and North Sligo by Robert Bottom and Tom Morgan.

Robert Bottom was born in Cambridge in 1944 and trained at Canterbury College of Art. He has been Head of Art at Campbell College, Belfast since 1975. He has exhibited extensively over the last 20 years, including one-man shows at the Ulster Arts Club Gallery, Cavehill Gallery, Belfast, and the Oriel Gallery, Dublin; he has participated in group shows at the Royal Ulster Academy and the Royal Hibernian Academy. His work is featured in private collections in Ireland, England, America, Australia and Japan. Winner of the 1992 Lang prize for painting.

This exhibition, the "Place of the Three Stones" is the product of a longtime collaboration with Belfast poet Tom Morgan. Both artists draw their inspiration from the unique scenery and environment of North Sligo.

EDUCATION PROGRAMME

Cúirt has organised a poetry competition for young people. Entrants may send up to two poems to Des Kenny, Kenny's Bookshop, High Street, Galway by March 20, 1992. Prizes will be awarded within three age divisions: under 12's; under 15's and under 18's and a workshop will be offered to a limited, selected group on Saturday, April 4th, 2:30 pm at Nun's Island.

IOGRAPHIES

SIMON ARMITAGE

Simon Armitage was born in Huddersfield in 1963 and works as a probation officer. His first collection, Zoom, was published by Bloodaxe in 1989 and sold out. He is widely regarded as one of the best English poets of his generation.

JAMES BERRY

Born in Jamaica, James Berry emigrated to the UK in 1948. As well as writing poetry and stories he has worked extensively for multicultural education. He won the Signal Poetry Award in 1989. the Cholmondely Award in 1991 and, in 1990, received an OBE.

ERNEST BRYLL

Ernest Bryll is a former literary director of the Polish Theatre in Warsaw. His prose and poetry has been translated into English by Czeslaw Milosz and into several other languages. He is fluent in Irish and has translated the major Irish epic poems into Polish. He has been Polish Ambassador to Ireland since 1991.

MOYA CANNO

Moya Cannon is from Donegal and lives in Galway. Much of her poetry focuses on the seascape and landscape of Galway and North Clare. Her much-praised debut collection, *Car*, was published by Salmon in 1990.

HARRY CLIFTON

Harry Clifton was born in Dublin in 1952. Five collections of his poetry have been published by Gallery, *The Desert Route, Selected Poems 1973-88*, being the most recent. He is a past winner of the Patrick Kavanagh Award.

IAIN CRICHTON SMITH

lain Crichton Smith was born on the Isle of Lewis in 1925. He writes in both Gaelic and English and his work spans some forty years. He is one of the century's foremost Scottish poets. The *TLS* comments thus: "Over the years his poetry has increased in strangeness and beauty."

VICKI CROWLEY

Born in Malta, Vicki Crowley has lived in Galway since 1970, where she has become well-known for her work as an artist; she has exhibited widely both here and abroad. *Oasis in a Sea of Dust*, her first poetry collection is due shortly from Salmon.

IAN DUHIG

lan Duhig was born in London of Irish parents and now works as an activist for young homeless people in York. He won the National Poetry Competition in 1987 and his first full collection, The Bradford Count was published last year by Bloodaxe.

SEAN DUNNE

Sean Dunne was born in Waterford in 1956 and now lives in Cork, where he works as a journalist. Against the Storm, his first poetry collection, was published in 1985. His prose work, In My Father's House was a best-seller last Christmas.

PAUL DURCAN

Paul Durcan is one of Ireland's premier poets. His most recent volume *Crazy About Women* featured in the best-seller lists for nearly six months. He is a former Whitbread Poetry Prize Winner.

ANNE FRATER

Born on the Isle of Lewis in 1967, Anne Frater began writing poetry while attending Glasgow University. Her work has been published in numerous Scottish magazines. She is currently doing a Ph.D on Scottish Gaelic Women's Literature up to 1750.

JERZY JARNIEWICZ

Jerzy Jarniewicz is a lecturer in English literature at the University of Lodz, Poland. He is the author of two volumes of poetry and has been published widely in literary reviews in Ireland and England.

LIZ LOCHHEAD

Liz Lochead was born in Motherwell in 1947 and currently lives in Glasgow. Her first collection of poems Memo For Spring was published in 1972 and subsequent collections include Dreaming Frankenstein and Collected Poems and True Confessions and New Clichés . She has written extensively for radio and television.

JAYANTA MAHAPATRA

Jayanta Mahapatra was born in 1928 in Cuttack, India, where he still lives. He graduated from Patna University with an MSc in Physics in 1949 and lectured thereafter in the subject. He has published 12 collections of verse in India, Britain and the U.S., including Selected Poems, (OUP 1987).

MAGUIRE AND McBRIDE

Connor Maquire and Charlie McBride have been writing and performing regularly together since 1988. As a duo and also as members of the Galway Comedy Cumann they have appeared at many of the country's major arts festivals. Their first play, Aingeal An Chladaigh, was produced last December at An Taibhdhearc by Na Fanalithe Theatre Company.

HUGH McMILLAN

Hugh McMillan was born in Mull in 1955 and began writing poetry in 1983. He won the Scottish National Poetry Competition and the Hugh McDiarmaid Trophy in 1984. *Tramontana*, his first major collection, was published in 1990.

PAULA MEEHAN

Paula Meehan is a native of Dublin and attended Trinity College and Eastern Washington University. Three collections of her poetry have been published to date; Return and No Blame, Reading the Sky, and The Man Who Was Marked by Winter.

TOM MORGAN

Tom Morgan hails from Ligoniel in Northern Ireland. He taught for twenty years in a secondary school in Belfast where he was Head of English. Three collections of his poetry have been published, most recently, In Queen Mary's Gardens (Salmon)

NUALA NI DHOMHNAILL

One of Ireland's foremost poets, Nuala ni Dhomhnaill was born in Lancashire of Irish parents and grew up in Dingle. Her first collection appeared in 1981 and five others, in Irish and English, have followed. Her most recent volumes are Feis, (An Sagart, 1991) and Pharaoh's Daughter, New and Selected Poems (Gallery 1990) in which her works are translated by numerous leading Irish poets.

JOHNNY O COISDEALBHA (JOHNNY CHOIL MHAIDHC)

Johnny Choil Mhaidhc was born and still lives in Inverin, Connemara. He is a celebrated author, raconteur and entertainer. He has written a number of plays and his first volume of poems, Buille Faoi Thuairim Gabha appeared in 1987.

MARY O'MALLEY

Mary O'Malley was born in Connemara and educated in UCG. She lived for eight years in Portugal, an experience which informs much of the work in her volume, A Consideration of Silk (Salmon 1990).

MICHEAL O'SIADHAIL

Micheal O'Siadhail was born and lives in Dublin. He has been a lecturer in Trinity but is now a full time writer. He has published three collections, most recently The Chosen Garden (1990). He is a member of Aosdana and the Arts Council.

STEPHEN OXLEY AND KIKA MIRYLEES

Stephen Oxley is a Londoner and has been acting since 1977. Kika Mirylees trained in both England and Czechoslovakia. Between them they have worked with some of Britain's foremost companies, including the RSC, the National Theatre and the Royal Court. Both of them have also made many television appearances. Stephen Oxley appeared in Galway in 1990 with his hit one-man show, *Tristram Shandy*.

KATHIE PRINCE AND MARY MEDLICOTT

Kathie Prince trained as a wood-wind teacher, specialising in clarinet before going on to work in theatre-in-education. She has composed music for theatre, dance and television productions all over Britain and Ireland. Mary Medlicott has been working in storytelling since 1980. She has run workshops and courses for many organisations and educational projects. She has also done television programmes of storytelling for Channel 4.

TIM ROBINSON

Tim Robinson was born in Yorkshire in 1935. In 1972 he moved to the West of Ireland to write and to make maps. His books and studies on the region have won the Ford European Conservation Award (1988) and European Year of the Environment Award (1987). Books include Mapping South Connemara and Stones of Aran. He now lives in Roundstone.

GABRIEL ROSENSTOCK

Gabriel Rosenstock was born in Dublin and is currently chairman of Poetry Ireland. His new and selected poems *Oráistí* is published by Cló Iar-Chonnachta. He has translated the works of many contemporary poets into Irish.

DEIRDRE SHANAHAN

Born in London of Irish parents, Deirdre Shanahan lives and works there still. Enitharmon Press published her debut collection, Legal Tender, in 1988. Her radio play, Prussian Blue, was broadcast by RTE in 1990.

R.S. THOMAS

R.S. Thomas is indubitably one of the finest poets now writing. He was born in Cardiff in 1913 and in 1936 was ordained a clergyman in the Church of Wales. His Selected Poems 1946-68 was published by Bloodaxe in 1986. "He has created his own form of bleak Welsh pastoral, streaked with indignation over the history of Wales and the Welsh" (Margaret Drabble).

COLM TOIBIN


