6.00 PM Festival Launch

Cúirt '93 is officially launched by longtime friend and patron, playwright and novelist, Thomas Kilroy.

8.30 PM John McGahern and Beryl Bainbridge

Cúirt '93 gets underway in earnest with a reading featuring two of the most eminent prose writers in these islands. John McGahern is the author of three collections of short stories and five highly acclaimed novels, including 'The Dark' 1965, 'The Pornographer' 1979 and 'Amongst Women' 1990 which was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and won the Aer Lingus/ Irish Times prize. His 'Collected Stories' were published last year by Faber & Faber. "He has the Irish gift of being able to move fluently and unselfconsciously between a simple and a heightened style" (TLS)

Since the early 1970s Beryl Bainbridge has written thirteen novels, two works of nonfiction and five television plays. Her novel 'The Dressmaker' was filmed in 1988 and 'Injury Time' won the Whitbread Prize. 'An Awfully Big Adventure' was shortlisted for the Booker Prize in 1990. Her novel 'The Birthday Boys' was recently published by Penguin.

Seamus Heaney

8.30 PM Seamus Heaney

The first appearance at Cúirt by Ireland's most renowned living poet. Widely and justly celebrated for his flawless handling of the lyric, Seamus Heaney has published eight collections of poetry since his 1966 debut 'Death Of A Naturalist'. Other major collections include 'North', 'Station Island' and, most recently, 'Seeing Things'. He has also published two volumes of essays, 'Preoccupations' 1980 and 'Government of the Tongue' 1988 and his verse-play 'The Cure At Troy' was produced by Field Day. In 1989, he was elected to the post of Professor of Poetry at Oxford University. He spends part of each year teaching at Harvard University.

1.00 PM Patricia Burke Brogan and Vincent Woods

This lunchtime poetry reading brings together the writers responsible for two of Ireland's theatrical highpoints of 1992 but who are also developing an increasing reputation as poets. Patricia Burke Brogan's 'Eclipsed' - performed by Punchbag Theatre Co. - won a Fringe First at the Edinburgh Festival. She has also won many awards for her poems, short stories and paintings.

Vincent Woods' play 'At The Black Pig's Dyke' was a major popular and critical success for Druid. 'The Colour Of Language', his first full poetry collection, will be published later this year.

4.00 PM Nina Fitzpatrick and John Arden

A most unusual afternoon event which features the literary "coming out" of the enigmatic Nina Fitzpatrick and a rare appearance by the playwright and novelist John Arden. Nina Fitzpatrick's first book 'Fables of the Irish Intelligentsia' received an Irish Times/AerLingus Award which was subsequently withdrawn in controversial circumstances. A follow-up novel, 'The Loves of Fustyna' has just been published.

John Arden has written numerous plays both "solo" and in collaboration with Margaretta d'Arcy amongst which are 'Serjeant Musgrave's Dance', 'The Royal Pardon' and 'The Non-Stop Connolly Show'. His first novel, 'Silence Among The Weapons', was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and it has been followed by 'Books of Bale' and 'Cogs Tyrannic'.

8.00 PM June Jordan and Ciarán Carson

Poet, essayist, activist and playwright June Jordan is the most published African-American writer in history. Born in Harlem and the author of over ten works. her writing is remarkable for its clarity, hope, anger and visionary power. 'Technical Difficulties', a selection of

essays and 'Haruko/Love Poetry' comprising old and new poems have just been published by Virago. "..the most powerful political writer in the West" (Sunday Times).

Ciarán Carson was born in Belfast in 1948 and is currently Literature Officer with the Northern Ireland Arts Council. Among his collections are 'The Irish For No' and 'Belfast Confetti'. Winner of an Irish Times Aer Lingus Award, he has been described as "one of the most gifted imaginations in contemporary poetry".

Henry Normal performs his cunningly conceived one man show 'Encyclopaedia Poetica'. He has published seven collections of verse, done a successful TV series for Channel 4 and has been one of the most popular acts at Edinburgh Festivals. His poetry, honed on the Mancunian rock n' roll circuit, "marries the suburban beauty of the Beatles' ballads with the blunt candour of the kitchen sink" (The Guardian).

1.00 PM Jean Valentine and Gerard Donovan

Jean Valentine, acknowledged as one of America's finest poets, has published five collections of verse, which have been described as "...heroic guesses pushing poetry out where it must both float and support.." She is joined by Gerard Donovan who grew up in Galway and currently lives in Arkansas. He has been shortlisted for Hennessy Awards in Poetry and his debut collection 'Colombus Rides Again' was published last November.

8.00 PM Les Murray and Piotr Sommer



One of the Highlights of Cúirt '93 is this reading by Australia's Les Murray, widely recognised as one of the finest poets now writing in English. Les Murray was born in 1938 (on the same day as Evel Knievel!). He grew up in the farming community of New South Wales where he has returned to write full-time. Five collections of his poetry have been published in the U.K., including 'Collected Poems' and in March '93 - 'Translations From The Natural World'. "There is no poetry in the English Language now so rooted in its sacredness, so broad-leafed in its pleasures, and yet so intimate and so conversational" (Nobel Prize winner -Derek Walcott).

Joining Les Murray is Piotr Sommer, another one of the striking new generation of Polish poets. Six volumes of his poetry have been published in Poland. An accomplished translator, his first collection of poems in English 'Things to Translate' was published by Bloodaxe in 1991.

Michael Davitt

The George MacBeth Memorial Lecture

Born in Newcastle in 1938, Rodney Pybus is the author of six highly-praised volumes of poetry, the most recent being 'Cicadas in Their Summers: New and Selected Poems'. "Pybus' intelligence is formidable ... his themes are good, his language hard and contemporary". (Douglas Dunn)

Michael Davitt has been writing poetry in Irish since the age of sixteen and, to date has published three collection of his work; 'Gleann ar Ghleann' 1981, 'Bligeard Sráide' 1982, and 'Rogha Dánta' 1987.

3.00 PM Lecture: Anthony Thwaite on Philip Larkin

Though he published only four full collections during his lifetime, Philip Larkin was one of the most widely-revered English poets of his generation. The posthumous appearance of his 'Collected Poems' and the controversial 'Selected Letters', both edited by Anthony Thwaite, has shown public interest in his life and work to be as keen

Anthony Thwaite is himself a poet of considerable repute and was a close friend of Larkin's for many years.

7.30 PM John Banville

Since the appearance of his first novel 'Long Lankin' in 1970, John Banville has established himself as one of the finest novelists of our age. Seven subsequent novels have followed that auspicious debut amongst which are 'Doctor Copernicus', 'Kepler' and 1989's 'The Book of Evidence' which was show-



ered with critical accolades and won the GPA Award. This evening will feature the premiere public reading of his new novel 'Ghosts' which is published on April 14.

9.00 PM Wendy Cope and Glyn Maxwell

Wendy Cope's 'Making Cocoa for Kingsley Amis' has sold an astonishing 40,000 copies making her the U.K.'s most popular poet. Her follow-up volume 'Serious Concerns' consolidates that position. Like its predecessor it is full of poems that are immediate, finelycrafted and immensely funny.

She is joined by Glyn Maxwell who The Guardian described as "England's brightest new poet for a decade". His first book 'Tale of the Mayor's Son' was published by Bloodaxe in 1990 and it was followed, in 1991, by 'Out of The Rain'. A collection of his verse plays 'Gnyss The Magnificent' will be published in June.

12.00 NOON Bardic Breakfast

A midday feast of food, poetry, music and humour featuring a second chance to enjoy the incomparable wit and wisdom of Wendy Cope. She is joined by one of the brightest of the new generation of Galway poets, Ann O'Dea, who has attracted considerable interest with her "miniaturist" verse. Music is provided by the Galway Early Music Group, who play recorders, gemshorns and the like while disporting themselves in Tudor costumes. 8.00 PM Richard Murphy and **Anthony Thwaite**



Richard Murphy

Drimcong House once again hosts the Festival's poetic finale. Richard Murphy is one of Ireland's most admired and accomplished poets. Born in the West of Ireland, he spent much of his childhood in Ceylon. He first gained widespread attention with 'Sailing to an Island' which was selected by T.S. Eliot for publication by Faber in 1963. Many other collections followed including 'The Battle of Aughrim' and 'New Selected Poems'. His most recent volume is 'The Mirror Wall'.

Anthony Thwaite has taught at both the Universities of Tokyo and Libya. He is a former literary editor of The Listener and The Statesman. Seven volumes of his poetry have been published as well as a selected collection 'Poems 1953-88'. Regarded as a "a master of poetic form" he has also edited several anthologies including the 'Penguin Book of Japanese Verse' and 'Six Centuries of Verse' based on a major Channel 4 series.





9.00 PM Tony Benn and Ruth Winston

One of the most intriguing events of Cúirt '93 is this talk by English Labour politician, Tony Benn. He was first elected an M.P. in 1950 and held various cabinet positions in the 1960's and 70's. Convinced of the necessity for an accurate contemporaneous record of his thoughts and actions, he has kept a daily diary throughout his career. His voluminous diaries have now been edited by Ruth Winston and published in six volumes. These diaries, together with eight other books, make Benn one of the most prolific and respected political writers in Britain today.



Poetry Masterclass


