Since her first publication appeared in 1964, Canadian Margaret Atwood has published over twenty books comprising novels, short stories, poetry and literary criticism. She has won numerous awards for such acclaimed volumes as The Handmaid's Tale, Cat's Eye and The Robber Bride. Her most recent publications are Morning in the Burned House (poems) and the children's book Princess Prunella and the Purple Peanut, both of which appeared last year.

MARY MORRISSY & MIKE McCORMACK

This reading showcases two of the most exciting Irish writers to have emerged over the past year. Mary Morrissy's debut collection of short stories, A Lazy Eye, was published by Cape in 1993 to widespread acclaim and was followed, in 1995, by her first novel Mother of Pearl. That same year she was awarded America's prestigious Lannan Literary Award for both books.

Colum McCann was born in Dublin in 1966 and made his debut with the highly-praised short story collection, Fishing the Sloe-Black River. In 1994 he won the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature and last year saw the publication of his first novel Songdogs. He

presently lives and works in New York. Jennifer Johnston is one of Ireland's foremost writers. Her novels include The Captains and the Kings, How Many Miles To Babylon, The Old Jest (winner of the Whitbread Prize) and Shadows on our Skin (shortlisted for the Booker Prize) Several of her works have been successfully adapted for film and television. At Cúirt, she will read from her most recent novel The Illusionist, published last September.

The Israeli poet Ronny Someck was born in 1951 and is the author of six volumes of verse. His themes are drawn from politics, pop culture, family life and his country's landscapes. This

in 1991. That same year, his essay Can Poetry Matter ignited a
national debate on the role of poetry in contemporary America.

KATHLEEN JAMIE & SIMON ARMITAGE

Scottish poet Kathleen Jamie was born in 1962 and, in 1981, became one of the youngest ever winners of the Gregory Award. Her first collection, *Black Spiders* was published the following year and it has been followed by acclaimed volumes such as *The Way We Live*, *The Autonomous Region* and *The Queen of Sheba*. Much of her work has drawn on her travels through some of the wildest regions of Pakistan, Tibet and Baltistan. She now lives and works in the Orkneys. "This fierce, blanched, singing verse is exquisitely gathered by a fine ear" (London Review of Books)

Simon Armitage is widely acknowledged as one of Britain's finest young poets. Born in Huddersfield in 1963, he has produced 4 collections to date; Zoom, Kid, Book of Matches and most recently, The Dead Sea Poems. Twice shortlisted for the Whitbread Prize, he was the Sunday Times 1993 choice as Young Writer of the Year.

Jacques Rancourt was born in Quebec in 1946 and has lived in Paris since 1971. A poet, essayist and translator, he has published eight collections of verse. These include The Distribution of Bodies, a bi-lingual edition of his work published by Dedalus in 1995.

Mexican poet Mario Del Valle was born in 1945 in Vera Cruz. His first collection, Linea Rota, was published in 1973 and three others have followed, most recently Luz de Plomo (1996). Del Valle is also celebrated as the founder and editor of the award-winning publishing house 'Ediciones Papeles Privados' which specialises in books of

Two highly distinctive poets come together for what promises to be a thoroughly compelling reading. Máire Mhac an tSaoi was born in Dublin in 1922. She is widely recognised as one of the foremost poets working in the Irish language today. Máire has

published numerous collections of poetry, the most recent being *An Cion go dtí Seo* (1990) as well as the cassette release of *Guth an Fhile* (1992).

Paul Muldoon, born in 1951, is widely regarded as the leading Irish poet of his generation. Collections include *Mules*, *Quoof*, *Madoc* and *New Selected Poems 1968-94*, all published by Faber. A new collection, *Kerry Slides*, has just been published by Gallery.



NICK CURRIE & BENJAMIN ZEPHANIAH

Born in Scotland, currently living in Paris, Nick Currie, also known as Momus, will sing and read from his recently published book *Lusts of a Moron. "His words are bewildering and breathtaking and shocking in a way I find difficult to resist"* (Simon Armitage).

Dub-poet and playwright Benjamin Zephaniah broke through on the British cabaret and performance circuit in the early '80s and the poetry world has never been the same since. His work, fashioned in English and Jamaican patois, is a heady and potent mix of critical wit and extraordinary verbal agility. Books include *The Dread Affair, Rasta Time In Palestine* and *City Psalms*. A dynamic and exhilarating performer, this event promises to be one of the Festival's highlights.

THEO DORGAN & STEPHEN DUNN

Poet, editor and broadcaster Theo Dorgan was born in Cork in 1953. His poetry collections include the highly-praised Ordinary House of Love and Rosa Mundi. With Gene Lambert, he co-edited The Great Book of Ireland and he is the editor of the forthcoming Irish Poetry After Kavanagh. He also presents RTE Radio One's Poetry Now and is the Director of Poetry Ireland. American poet Stephen Dunn has published 9 collections of poetry, including New and Selected Poems 1974-1994, Landscape at the End of the Century, and Full of Lust and Good Usage. His work has received numerous awards, including a Guggenheim Fellowship, three NEA Creative Writing Fellowships and a Theodore Roethke Prize. "He is a poet of wisdom... a healer and a teacher... The music is perfect as the art is hidden, and some of the poems are unbearably beautiful. He is a magnificent poet" (Gerald Stern).

He first achieved prominence with his third novel, *The Butcher Boy* (1992) which won the Irish Times/ Aer Lingus Fiction Prize and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize. His play, *Frank Pig Says Hello*, based on that novel has successfully toured in three continents. McCabe's latest novel, *The Dead School* has just been published in paperback by Picador.



Edinburgh's Irvine Welsh burst onto the literary scene in 1993 with his incendiary novel *Trainspotting*. A ferocious, bleakly funny account of junkie society in Edinburgh's housing projects, it rapidly achieved best-seller status. An acclaimed film version of the book, directed by Danny Boyle, has recently been released. Welsh followed his debut with 1994's *The Acid House*, a collection of stories and his second novel, *Marabou Stork Nightmares*, published last year. "Welsh writes with a skill, wit and compassion that amounts to genius. He is the best thing that has happened to British writing for decades." (Sunday Times)

Other works include *Selected Poems, The Shadow of Hiroshima and Other Film Poems* and *The Trackers of Oxyrhynchus*. EVENTS AND EXHIBITIONS

POETRY MASTERCLASS

This years Masterclass will be given by Eileán Ní Chuilleanáin, a lecturer in English and a fellow of Trinity College, Dublin. Winner of the Patrick Kavanagh Award in 1973 for her poetry collection Acts and Monuments. More recently she was awarded the O'Shaughnessy Prize for poetry in 1992 by the Irish American Cultural Institute. She has edited at several publishing houses and is a co-founder of Cyphers, Ireland's longest running literary magazine. She will conduct a poetry Masterclass over two days commencing on Saturday, April 20th from 10.30am to 1.00pm and on Sunday, April 21st from 11am to 1.00pm. The class, which is limited to twelve participants, is designed for previously published writers or those with a serious intention of publishing their work. Participants are required to submit three poems at least one week in advance.

The Táin portfolios contain the original lithographic brush drawings which were made in 1968 - 69 by Le Brocquy to illustrate Thomas Kinsella's inspired translation of the Táin Bo Cuailnge. These works illustrate the dramatic record of the eighth century Ulster cycle of heroic tales.
