An Taibhdhearc Ben Okri

Cúirt '97's inaugural reading features the renowned Nigerian novelist, short story writer and poet, Ben Okri. He published his first novel Flowers & Shadows in 1980, followed in 1981 by The Landscapes Within. His short story collection Incidents at the Shrine was short-listed for the Commonwealth Prize for 1987 and won the Paris Review Aga Khan Prize for fiction. His subsequent collection Stars of the New Curfew was short-listed for The Guardian Fiction Prize in 1988. Ben Okri's novel The Famished Road was published in 1991 and won the Booker Prize for fiction. A collection of poems An African Elegy was published in 1992 and was followed, in 1993, by Songs of Enchantment the sequel to The Famished Road. His latest novel Dangerous Love was published last year. £5/£4

Vicki Feaver & Margit Schreiner

Poet Vicki Feaver was born in Nottingham, home of Raleigh bicycles, Players' cigarettes and, reputedly, beautiful girls. Her debut collection, *Close Relatives* was published by Seker in 1981, with her second volume *The Handless Maiden* being published by Cape in 1994. One of the poems in this collection was awarded the Forward Prize for best poem in 1994 and the collection itself won a Heinemann Prize. Vicki Feaver is also published in volume two of the new *Penguin Modern Poets* series alongside Carol Ann Duffy and Eavan Boland. She teaches at Chichester's Institute of Higher Education where she leads an MA in Creative Writing.

Margit Schreiner was born in Austria in 1953 and now lives in Berlin. A poet and short story writer, amongst her many awards are The Ernst Koref Award (1986) and the Theodor Körner Award (1987). She has published three collections of short stories including *The Roses of Saint Benedict, Love and Hate Stories* (1989) and *The Suppression of Women, The Virility of Men, Catholicism and Dirt* (1995). Samuel Menashe & John Agard

American Jewish poet Samuel Menashe was born in New York in 1925. He is a poet of rare gifts, who counts among his admirers Robert Graves, Kathleen Raine, Austin Clarke & Derek Mahon. Menashe is a master of minimalist poetics, his typical poem being from four to six lines long.

Poet, performer and anthologist John Agard was born in Guyana and moved to Britain in 1977. He has won the Casa de la Americas Prize, was short listed for the Kurt Maschler Award, was awarded an Arts Council Bursary and became the first Writer in Residence at London's South Bank Centre in 1993. He has published plays, poetry and children's books. £4 / £3

Carol Ann Duffy & Michael Donaghy

Born in Glasgow in 1955, Carol Ann Duffy is not only one of the UK's leading poets, but one of the most important of all post-war British poets. She has received an extraordinary number of awards, including a Cholmondeley Award in 1992 and the Forward Poetry Prize and Whitbread Poetry Award in 1993. Her latest collection is from Salmon Publishing. Entitled *The Salmon Carol Ann Duffy*, it contains poetry of an Irish flavour chosen by Carol Ann from her four previous volumes.

Michael Donaghy was born in the Bronx, New York, in 1954 and has lived in England since 1985. His collections to date are *Shibboleth*, which won the Whitbread Prize for Poetry and the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize, and *Errata*, published by OUP in 1993. £5 / £4

Colm Tóibín & Ruth Padel




Journalist and novelist, Colm Tóibín was born in Wexford in 1955. His first novel was the hugely impressive *The South* (1990), set largely in Spain. Other works since then include *The Heather Blazing* (1993) and the non-fiction *Travels in Catholic Europe* (1994), and, most recently, *The Story of the Night* (1996).

Ruth Padel is gaining a reputation as one of the most intelligent and exciting poets writing today. She has published three collections; *Summer Snow, Angel* and *Fusewire*, which appeared last year. Two non-fiction works have also been published, *In and Out of the Mind* and *Whom Gods Destroy*. £4/£3

Two poets who are both recognised as dynamic readers of their work. Born in Liverpool in 1946, Brian Patten can claim to be one of the founding fathers of modern performance poetry. Initially grouped with fellow-Liverpudlians Roger McGough and Adrian Henri, he has read his work everywhere from California to Khartoum. His work is a beguiling mix of the serious and humorous and few poets can equal him in performance. Linton Kwesi Johnson was born in Jamaica in 1952. He first came to prominence in the 1970's as a poet and performer through work such as Dread Beat An' Blood, Inglan Is A Bitch and Forces Of Victory. Acclaimed as the world's first dub poet, he is the acknowledged head of the new wave of performance poets whose words weld politics and social conscience with a potent challenge to those in power. He has toured from Japan to South Africa, Europe to Brazil. £5/£4



Eamonn Sweeney was born in Sligo in 1968 and currently lives in Dublin. His short stories have been widely published and, in 1995, he won the

European/Raconteur Short Story Prize. He will read from his first novel *Waiting for the Healer*, which has just been published by Picador.

Dublin based **Donal O'Kelly** has combined his acting and writing careers for the past decade. His one-man shows include *Rabbit* and *Bat the Father, Rabbit the Son* and, most recently, *Catalpa, The Movie.* Other plays he has written include *Hughie on the Wires, Trickledown Town* and *Asylum! Asylum!* Recent acting appearances include performing his own play *Catalpa, The Movie* at Dublin's Gate Theatre and co-starring in the film adaptation of Roddy Doyle's *The Van.* £3/£2

Barry McGovern is one of Ireland's best known actors. Theatre work includes Waiting for Godot, Endgame, Krapps Last Tape, Happy Days, Dancing at Lughnasa, Twelfth Night and A Midsummer Nights Dream. TV includes Eamon de Valera in The Treaty and Guiseppe Conlon in Dear Sarah and films include Riders to the Sea, Billy Bathgate, Far and Away, Braveheart and Driftwood. He has had major international success with his award-winning one-man Beckett show I'll Go On presented by the Gate Theatre. He is widely recognised as Ireland's greatest living exponent of the works of Beckett. For this event he will read a selection of Beckett's writings. £4/£3

5.30 PM Seamus Heaney - Metres Meet

To celebrate the publication in April of The School Bag, a companion anthology to The Rattle Bag edited by Seamus Heaney and Ted Hughes, Ireland's pre-eminent poet Seamus Heaney will read from his own work and from some translations by him of other poems which appear in the anthology. Seamus Heaney has won numerous awards including the Somerset Maugham Award (1968), the Denis Devlin Award (1973), the Duff Cooper Memorial Prize (1975) the American Irish Foundation Literary Award (1973) and the W.H. Smith Annual Award (1976). In 1987 he was awarded the Whitbread Award for The Haw Lantern and in 1996 the Whitbread Prize and the T.S. Eliot Poetry Prize for The Spirit Level. In October 1995 Seamus Heaney was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature, £6 / £4

Bernard O'Donoghue was born in Cullen, Co. Cork in 1945 and now lives in Oxford where he teaches medieval English at Wadham College. He has published three main collections of verse; Poetry Rights (1987), The Weakness (1991) and Gunpowder (1995) which won the Whitbread Poetry Prize. A native of Brooklyn, New York, Michael S. Harper is one of America's finest living poets. His sensitive, personal verse is concerned with ancestral kinships, jazz and the blues, and emerges out of the fire of African American experience. The first Poet Laureate of Rhode Island he has received numerous awards including the Black Academy of Arts and Letters Award for Poetry and the Robert Hayden Poetry Award from the United Negro College Fund. He is University Professor and Professor of English at Brown University, Rhode Island, £5 / £4




