Novelist Deirdre Madden is from County Antrim. In 1987 she won the Rooney Prize for Hidden Symptoms, and two years later received the Somerset Maugham Prize for The Birds of the Innocent Wood. Her most recent novel, 1996s, One by One in the Darkness, was shortlisted for the Orange Prize. Poet, novelist and playwright Carmen Boullosa is one of Mexico's foremost writers. She has received numerous awards and fellowships, including the Xavier Villaurrutia Award (1989), Guggenheim Fellowship (1992) and was Mexico's Playwright of the Year in 1985. In November 1997, Berlin's Freie

Universitat hosted a symposium on her work which attracted 26 contributors from six countries.

Among her many works for stage are Mary Queen of Scots Got Her Head Chopped Off, Dracula, Blood and Ice, and Sweet Nothings which was screened by the BBC. She lives in Glasgow. Born in Belfast in 1942, Bernard MacLaverty has published three novels and four collections of short stories. Two of his novels, Lamb and Cal were produced as major films. He has also won the Scottish Arts Council Book award three times. Grace Notes, his first novel for fourteen years, was published last year and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize.

Born in Cambridge, England in 1950 Tom Robinson became one of the most respected singer/songwriters of his generation. His first album was produced by Ray Davies of The Kinks in 1974. Since then he has recorded several albums, many of which have become classics, including Power in the Darkness and Hope and Glory. His 1994 recording, Love Over Rage, which was hailed as major return to form, was followed in '96 by the critically acclaimed Having it Both Ways. He was awarded a UK Sony Radio Award last year for his programme You've Got To Hide Your Love Away and this year sees the release of a 1990's compilation Modern Classics.

Tom Paulin is a renowned poet, essayist, critic and editor. Born in Leeds in 1949, he grew up in Belfast and is currently lecturing in English at Oxford. writing poetry. She was held for three years in a "strict regime" labour camp. Her poems were smuggled out of the camp, and published by Bloodaxe in No, I'm Not Afraid, the book which spearheaded an international campaign which eventually secured her release. Other collections include Pencil Letters and Dance with a Shadow. Ratushinskaya currently lives in London.


