





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

In a special event, Cúirt International Festival of Literature presents **Carlos Fuentes**, lecturer, essayist, diplomat, and above all, writer. Nothing human is alien to him, and he is situated significantly in the panorama of Latin American literature. Through the decades Fuentes has built a "comedie humaine" creating a

parallel world through literature, a mirror in which Mexican society is reflected and recreated.

Author of more than a dozen novels, Fuentes' titles including Where the Air is Clear, The Death of Artemio Cruz, Terra Nostra, The Old Gringo, Christopher Unborn, The Orange Tree and Diana: The Goddess Who Hunts Alone. His many non-fictional works include the outstanding The Buried Mirror: Reflections on Spain and the New World and the Diary of Frieda Kahlo. He has also written numerous short stories, plays, articles as well as literary and political essays.

Among the many prizes he has been awarded are Mexico's National Prize for Literature (1984) and Spain's Miguel de Cervantes Prize for Literature (1988). He has served as Mexico's Ambassador to France and has held several visiting professorships. He has worked extensively in television and is best known for his part as on-camera host for the five part BBC television series, *The Buried Mirror*, a reflection on the complex relationship between Spain and Latin America.

For this event, he will read from his new book *The Years With Laura Diaz* and discuss his work with *Irish Times* writer, **Eileen Battersby**.





G.M. Young Lecturer in English Literature in Oxford, Paulin's most recent critical work is *The Day-Star of Liberty: William Hazlitt's Radical Style*. Currently living in Sligo, poet, novelist and dramatist, **Leland Bardwell** co-founded the literary magazine *Cyphers*. Her collections include *The Mad Cyclist*, *The Fly and the Bed Bug*, *Dostoevsky's Grave – New and Selected Poems* and *The White Beach*.

Vincent Woods, currently writer in residence at NUI Galway, was the recent recipient of Australia's Vincent Buckley Fellowship. His poems were collected in *The Colour of Language* and he is the author of Druid's hit play, *At the Black Pig's Dyke*. A children's book, *Framed*, with artist Monica Frawley will be published in the autumn, followed by a new collection of poetry *Life and Miracles*.

He co-edited *The Turning Wave: The Poetry and Ballads of Irish Australia* with Colleen Burke which will published in Australia in spring 2001. Born in Belfast, **Medbh McGuckian**'s work includes *The Flower Master, Venus and the Rain, On Ballycastle Beach, Marconi's Cottage,* and *Shelmalier* among others. Recognised as one of the foremost poets of her generation, she is currently Poet-in-Residence at Trinity College Dublin. *Marconi's Cottage* was shortlisted for the *Irish Times/*Aer Lingus Literature Prize for Poetry.



Born in Wicklow, **Claire Keegan** won the William Trevor Prize among others for her collection of short stories *Antarctica*. She is currently writing a novel and a second collection of short stories.

Dermot Healy was born in Westmeath in 1947. A poet, novelist and playwright, his novels include *Fighting with Shadows*, *A Goat's Song* and last year's *Sudden Times*. Healy's autobiography is entitled *The Bend for Home* and he recently made his screen debut in *I Could Read the Sky*. He is also founder editor of *Force 10*, Ireland's foremost community arts journal.

Aidan Mathews' first poetry collections were Minding Ruth and Windfalls; he then turned to fiction and drama for a decade's work which includes Exit/Entrance, Muesli at Midnight and Lipstick on the Host. He returned to poetry last year with According to the Small Hours, a collection that was described by Michael Longley as "abundant, enthralling, heart-breaking."

Don Paterson's Nil Nil won the Forward Prize for Best First Collection in 1993. It was nearly as highly praised as the Scotsman's second collection, God's Gift to Women. His most recent collection is The Eyes, an adventurous translation of a selection of Antonio Machado's poetry.

Sweeney and Waters are two of Ireland's ablest and most articulate cultural commentators: here they discuss the cultural traps of a changing Ireland. Born in Castlerea, Co. Roscommon, *Irish Times* columnist **John Waters** is author of plays for radio and the stage and numerous books, including *Jiving at the Cross-roads*, *An Intelligent Person's Guide to Ireland*, and *The Man in the Long Black Coat*. **Eamonn Sweeney** is author of *Waiting for the Healer* and *There's Only One Red Army*, his account of the trials, tribulations and occasional joys of supporting Sligo Rovers.

Izzat al-Ghazzawi is author of *The Woman Prisoner*, *A Critical View*, *Letters Underway*, *The Edges*, *Nebo Mountain*, and *Abdullah at-Titali*, and is leader of the Palestinian Writers Union. He was one of the leaders of the intellectual movement during the Intifada. Russianborn Alona Kimchi's work includes *I*, *Anastasia* which was awarded the ACUM Prize and *Weeping Susannah*. US-born Eyal Megged teaches creative writing and was awarded the 1993 Macmillan Prize. His titles include *Eden Park*, *Edge*, *Cup Final Stories*, and *Early Grace*. Megged and Kimchi are two of Israel's best known contemporary authors. Palestinian Rajaa Bakriyeh is both a writer and painter. Her work includes *Psalms to Ellul*, *Papers of a Small Woman* and a collection of short stories, soon to be published. In this forum, moderated by scholar John Maher and along with Irish writers, they

discuss their work and their responses to where they live and how they work. An open workshop prior to this forum will take place, details from Galway Arts Centre.

6.00 pm John Connolly and Mark Timlin



Dubliner John Connolly burst on to the international literary scene with the publication of Every Dead Thing and his latest book Dark Hollow justifies the promise of his debut. Included in the "One Hundred Masters of Crime", Mark Timlin is author of many crime books under many names, and reviews crime writing with the Independent on Sunday. He is one of today's most respected crime authors.

Born in Ireland and a graduate of University College Dublin, Neil Belton won the Irish Times Literature Award for Non-Fiction for The Good Listener: Helen Bamber, A Life Against Cruelty from which he will read. Reluctantly living in London, he is a highly respected editor and Director of Publishing at Granta Books.

Tom French's work has been widely published in various literary journals. In 1999, he read at Les Langagieres, Rheims and Belfast's Between The Lines literary festival, and has previously read at Cúirt. Poet, fiction writer and dramatist, Dublin-born **Deirdre Brennan**'s poetry collections include *I reilig na mban rialta*,

Scothanna geala, Thar cholbha na mara. A collection of her short stories won Duais Bhord na Gaelige in 1996.

4.00 pm Máire Mhac an tSaoi, Kathleen Jamie and Gabriel Fitzmaurice

Máire Mhac an tSaoi is one of Ireland's pre-eminent scholars and poets. Her poetry collections include A Heart Full of Thought, Codladh an Ghaisígh, Trasládáil, and her latest work is Shoa, agus Dánta Eile. Winner of the O'Shaughnessy Poetry Award of the Irish American Cultural Institute, and an authority on traditional Bardic poetry, she writes primarily in the Irish language. Awarded an honorary D. Lit. Celt from the National University of

Ireland, she was born in Dublin and has represented Ireland in the Council of Europe among other diplomatic missions. Born in Renfrewshire, Scotland, Kathleen Jamie teaches Creative Writing at the University of St Andrew's. Author of many poetry collections, the most recent, Jizzen, was shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot award. Jamie has also published a travel book about Northern Pakistan, The Golden Peak. Gabriel Fitzmaurice, widely known for his work with the Listowel Writer's Week, is author of more than twenty books, including poetry in English and Irish, children's verse in both languages, translations from Irish, essays, as well as collections of songs and ballads. His A Wrenboy's Carnival: Poems 1980-2000 will be published in Autumn 2000.

Newry-born Conor O'Callaghan has two poetry collections, The History of Rain (1993), for which he won the Patrick Kavanagh Award, and Seatown (1999) which is currently receiving warm reviews. A critic and broadcaster, his interest in cricket was memorably recorded in the Dick Warner-produced radio documentary, The Season. O'Callaghan is currently writer-in-residence at University College Dublin. Hugo Williams' latest collection, Billy's Rain, was the first collection by an English poet to win the prestigious T.S.Eliot

Prize. Earlier work includes Writing Home which Derek Mahon characterised as being "sung with the grave formality of a secular requiem". His journalism was collected in the acclaimed Freelancing: Adventures of a Poet.

Dubliner **Colum McCann** lives in New York City. He was awarded the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature for his short story collection *Fishing the Sloe-Black River*. His novels include *Songdogs* and *This Side of Brightness* which is nominated for this year's IMPAC Dublin Literary Award. McCann's new novel, *Everything In This Country Must*, is due out in April. Dundee-born **A.L. Kennedy** has written extensively in numerous

forms, from short story to novel, such as *So I Am Glad*, dramatic works to nonfiction, including her latest title *On Bullfighting*. She is included in *The Observer's* 21 writers for the 21st century, and won the Somerset Maugham Award and the John Llewellyn Prize.

Scottish singer-songwriter and former front man with The Waterboys, **Mike Scott** will re-unite with ex-Waterboys violinist extraordinaire **Steve Wickham** for a one-off date especially for Cúirt. Scott led the Waterboys through their million selling albums such as *This is the Sea* and *A Pagan Place* before going solo in 1995 with *Bring 'Em All In*. Resident in Galway during the early 1990s, Scott and

Wickham combined to great effect on albums like *Fisherman's Blues*. Scott, together with Wickham and the rest of the Waterboys, produced some of the best songs and music of the last fifteen years.

Derry-born Colette Bryce's work is included in Anvil New Poets and she has recently published her first collection The Heel of Bernadette, which has been hailed as "assured, original and promising" (The Irish Times). She was awarded an Eric Gregory Award in 1995 and lives in London, working as a freelance editor and bookseller.


4.00 pm John Kelly and Anne Enright


