Michael Longley & John McGahern

Through nine collections, **Michael Longley** transports us from the fields of Flanders, through the European Wars, to the troubled North of Ireland. Whether through "mine craters so vast they are called after cities" or "a single spring gentian shivering at our feet", Longley's poetry eases us towards our own personal civilisation. Winner of 2001 T.S. Eliot Prize for his latest collection, *The Weather in Japan*. **John McGahern** is considered the greatest living Irish short story writer. He has published several novels including Booker-nominated *Amongst Women* (1990) and volumes of short stories such as *Nightlines* (1970), *Getting Through* (1978), *High Ground* (1985) and *The Collected Stories* (1992), receiving numerous awards. Central to his concerns has ever been "the state of being Irish, its special deprivations and depravities".



Michael Collins & Sean O'Reilly

The short-listing of **Michael Collins's** novel *The Keepers of Truth* for the Booker Prize 2000 consolidated a reputation that grew rapidly after his début story collection *The Meat Eaters* (1992). Born in Limerick in 1964, Collins has been prolific on and off the page, publishing a further volume of stories and two other novels, and winning a number of extreme ultra-marathons. Thirty-two-year-old **Seán O'Reilly's** first book, *Curfew*, was one of last year's most acclaimed new story collections. While O'Reilly's style is beautifully gruesome and surreal, he delineates his native Derry with lucidity and precision. He currently divides his time between Dublin and Paris and his first novel, *Love and Sleep.* will be published later this year.

Poet and painter, **Frieda Hughes's** first collection *Wooroloo* (Bloodaxe) received a Poetry Book Society Special Commendation. The self she depicts in her poems is tested by loss, danger, fear and abandonment, yet transformed through experience into a world beyond nihilism and despair, a place which makes possible truth, strength, hope and the redemptive powers of love. **Inger Christensen**, born in Vejile, Denmark is an award winning poet and a member of the Danish Academy since 1978. She has published several collections, including *alfabet*. It has been translated into French and German and published in English translation by Bloodaxe. In *Butterfly Valley: A Requiem* (Dedalus) the structural complexity of the sonnet sequence is balanced out by the underlying musical principle, by the lyrical device of the linking imagery and by the line repetition device.

Richard Murphy & Andrew Motion

Born in 1952, poet, biographer and editor, winner of the Arvon / Observer Prize, the John Llewelyn Rhys Prize and the Dylan Thomas Prize, **Andrew Motion's** *Selected Poems* appeared in 1998. In 1994, his biography of Philip Larkin was awarded the Whitbread Prize for Biography. An anthology edited by the poet exploring the themes of self, home, town, work, land, travel, war, belief and space will be published in October 2001. He was appointed Poet Laureate in 1999. "Poetry is the best way of remembering though words the people we love". Born in 1927, through his signature poems and collections, **Richard Murphy** has embraced the world from *The Battle of Aughrim* and *Sailing to an Island* to *The Price of Stone*, culminating in his recent *Collected Poems*. He has the gift of epic objectivity - behind his poems we feel the actuality of events, the facts and sufferings of history.

Donal MacAmhlaigh Remembered

Donal MacAmhlaigh was born in Galway in 1926. He spent most of his formative years in Galway, and time in Limerick, the Curragh and Kilkenny, his father being in the army. After school, Donal joined *An Céad Cath*, the Irish speaking battalion of the army, based in Renmore Barracks. He emigrated to England, and eventually settled in Northampton. He was a prolific writer in Irish and in English and produced thousands of articles in journals and newspapers. His most famous books are *Saol Saíghduíra*, *Dialann Deoraí* and *Schnitzer Ó Shea*. He died in Northampton in 1989.

A commemorative plaque by Michael Wilkins will be unveiled at Scoil Fhursa National School, Nile Lodge, Galway where he spent some years as a pupil

Poet and novelist **Patrick Deeley** is a native of Loughrea and has just published his fourth collection, *Decoding Samara*, with the Dedalus Press. This new collection is exemplary of Deeley's quiet, resonant verse, layered with wit and quirky insights: "a wonderfully satisfying" collection. A director of Wolfhound Press, Dubliner **Siobhán Campbell's** first collection *The Permanent Wave* (1994) has been praised for the way in which the poems retrieve language from the "trap of ordinariness." *In The Cold That Burns* (Blackstaff, 2000), so called because of the quality of liquid nitrogen, Campbell interrogates the ways we struggle to make sense of the world with characteristic clear-eyed honesty, compassion and wry humour.

Kim Newman was born in London in 1959. He is one of the most acclaimed and prolific writers in the horror fiction genre. Since the early eighties, Dubliner **Clare Boylan** (b.1948) has issued an extensive range of work as author, contributor, editor and anthologist. Her five novels have been praised generally for their directness and humour and particularly for their evocations of the lives of women and children. She has recently published a collected edition of her short stories. Having produced significant work in the areas of film and biography, **Anne Haverty** is now launched on a career as novelist. While her eco-critical first novel, *One Day as a Tiger* (1997), was set in her native Tipperary, her most ambitious novel is her second, *The Far Side of a Kiss* (2000), a regenerative story concerning William Hazlitt's relationship with a London serving maid in the early nineteenth century.

Poet and painter, **Jo Slade** is a member of the Limerick Fourfront Poets group which was formed to work on collaborative poety. Her own collections include *In Fields I Hear Them Sing* (1989), *The Vigilant One* (1994) and an English and French edition of her selected poems, *Certain Octobers* (1997). Anthony Roche has said of Slade's work, "akin to the texture of paint on canvas, there is the vivid and sensual tactility" to her lines and language. In 1992, Joseph Brodsky described **Glyn Maxwell** as "a poet of immense promise and unforgettable delivery". Since then, Maxwell has won the Somerset Maugham Award and the E.M. Forster Prize and he has become one of the most prominent British poets of his generation: his latest collections are *The Boys at Twilight: Poems 1990-1995* and the Dantesque long poem "Time's Fool".

Book Launch – Ken Bruen & Richard Powers

Cúirt is honoured to host the launch of **Ken Bruen's** latest novel *The Guards* (Brandon) and Richard Powers' seventh novel, *Plowing the Dark* (Random House). Bruen's tenth novel is a superb *noir* piece set in the author's hometown of Galway: the intimate, bustling city illuminates the saga of Jack Taylor, a disgraced ex-cop who is drawn into the investigation of a teenage suicide which leads to a dark conspiracy. Powers' new novel has prompted sensational reviews from all quarters: "One of the few younger American writers who can stake a claim to the legacy of Pynchon, Gaddis and De Lillo" (*The Nation*).

Elena Shvarts & George Szirtes

Elena Shvarts - born in Leningrad in 1948, but not openly published there until 1989. Bella Akhmadulina has called her 'a miracle', describing her poetry as 'the purest of creations'. Shvarts draws backwoods Russian folklore with its cruelty, its religiosity and its quaint humour into her own image of St Petersburg, a haunted, demonic city nearer Dostoyevsky's than Akhmatova's or Brodsky's. Her selected poems *Paradises* published by Bloodaxe. **George Szirtes**, born in Budapest, spent his early childhood in Hungary before coming to England as a refugee. In 1984 he began to write about his native city, its history and the experience of leaving it. *The Budapest File* (Bloodaxe) gathers together his poems on Hungarian themes, exploring universal issues of loss, danger and exile.

Renowned as Ireland's most classically poised and allusive prose writer, **John Banville** (b.1945) has recently published his eleventh novel, *Eclipse* (2000). He gained renewed international attention with the stylised spy thriller, *The Untouchable* (1997), and is now also a noted adaptor of the work of Romantic German dramatist, Heinrich von Kleist. He is currently at work on his next novel, *Shroud*. Since his auspicious career launch with *Continent*, winner of the 1986 Whitbread First Novel and Guardian Fiction prizes, **Jim Crace** has written five further celebrated novels. Permanently preoccupied with human elementals, his most recent book, *Being Dead* (1999), is perhaps the most forensically honest, yet exhilarating work on death since Beckett. Born in Hertfordshire in 1946, he now lives in Birmingham.

Born in Nigeria, **Chris Abani** was imprisoned for six months at the age of 18 following the publication of his first novel. His second novel, *Sirocco* (1987), was seized by government forces and Abani was again detained for sedition. In 1991, he was arrested for the third time and held on death row. The poems in *Kalakuta Republic* are based on his experience as a political prisoner 1985-91. **Billy Childish** is a veteran of the Punk era. He lectures at the Royal College of Art in London, as well as at festivals the world over. His poetry explores the difficulties of being an individual in today's world.

William Shaw arrived in Compton, Los Angeles in the summer of 1997, white, middle-class and English. He spent a year hanging around with the boys who were trying to make it as hip-hop stars in an LA ghetto which has become largely seperated from the rest of the legendary city. Shaw's acclaimed Westsiders brings together a fascinating array of real-life characters, from the prospective stars of the talent shows where Eminem made his name to the street hustlers and entrepeneurs. Flashback to 1950 and at seventeen, Edward Bunker is the youngest ever inmate of the notorious San Quentin. Putting these experiences to good use, Bunker today has been described as "America's greatest living crime writer". The hard-boiled, from Quentin Tarantino to James Ellroy, have lauded his work and he is well-known to crime noir aficionados as Mr Blue in Tarantino's Reservoir Dogs. Bunker's autobiography, Mr Blue: Memoirs of a Renegade received this year's Macallan Prize for Non-Fiction.

Annie Proulx & Dame Beryl Bainbridge

Annie Proulx lives in Wyoming and published her first novel, *Postcards*, in 1991 at the age of 56. Her second novel, *The Shipping News* (Fourth Estate, 1993) won the Pulitzer, the National Book Award and the *Irish Times* International Prize. Her third novel, *Accordion Crimes*, was published in 1996. *Close Range* (Fourth Estate) is her latest collection of short stories, about Wyoming ranchers, cow hands and wives, showing grit and resignation against hardship, heartbreak and bad luck set in the cruel landscape of the new American West. Liverpool-born, **Dame Beryl Bainbridge** includes Bookernominated and multiple award winner *Master Georgie* as the latest novel in a career that spans over 30 years and includes plays, short stories and non fiction. Her other works include Whitbread winner *Injury Time* and Booker nominated *An Awfully Big Adventure* and *Every Man for Himself*.

Cuirt screens Ulysses

Ulysses (Dir. Joseph Strick, 1967) Certificate 15

In Ireland, from a book that spans a mere 24 hours, the film **Ulysses** was banned for 33 years, even longer than Kubrick's *A Clockwork Orange*. After a 25 year absence from Ireland, in February 2001, director Joseph Strick returned to see his fascinating adaptation of *Ulysses* by James Joyce, one of the world's most significant and allegedly unfilmable works, shown to an Irish audience. It was in the light of a deeply changed Ireland that Strick applied to have the ban by the censor lifted and allowed Irish audiences see his translation of Joyce's epic. James Joyce remains the master of Irish literature. It is this, along with his close connection to Galway and that of Nora Barnacle, that makes the screening of Strick's *Ulysses* a fitting close to Cúirt 2001.
