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
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# The Cuirt Annual

This year's festival sees the launch of Galway Arts Centre's flagship literary publication, the Cúirt Annual. The Annual is designed to highlight the range and vibrancy of contemporary literary activity at local, national and international level. Intimately linked to the literature programme of the Galway Arts Centre, the Annual will be a miscellany of the creative work produced as part of our workshop, website and festival activities.

The inaugural Annual features work by members of the Fairgreen Shelter, a shelter for homeless men based in Galway city centre, who have participated in a writing workshop hosted by dramatist and scriptwriter, Christian O'Reilly. There will also be a selection from Galway Arts Centre's literary quarterly, west47, which provides an outlet for new contemporary writing in Ireland and is shortly to be launched as a website. To reflect a cross-section of international writing, contributions of new work from our festival participants will also feature. In a time when literature tends to be compartmentalised, the Cúirt Annual will provide a snapshot of a variety of literary activities and styles.

Given the current publishing climate, it can be extremely difficult to fund a literary publication that does not obviously belong to a given category. The Cúirt Annual would not be possible without the financial support of Renvyle House Hotel, Connemara - Oliver St John Gogarty's former residence. Sponsorship of this kind is invaluable to an enterprise such as ours.

We would sincerely like to thank the generosity of contributors and sponsors alike and hope the Cúirt Annual proves a stimulating read this year and in those to come.

### Introduction

Welcome to the 18th Cúirt International Festival of Literature, taking place this year from 22 to 27 April. As always, we look forward to providing the opportunity for writers, artists and audiences to join together in celebrating the power of the written word in its various forms. We truly hope that you will find our programme of events enlivening, enriching and enjoyable.

Cúirt 2003 brings together a multiplicity of languages and nationalities: the theme for this year is **Exile**. The aim of Cúirt, as always, is to bring to the festival audience the very best of contemporary literature from a wide diversity of genres, styles and nationalities. The principal focus of this year's programme is poetry in translation, with an emphasis on the Near East.

The core of the festival will centre on Galway's Town Hall Theatre, with events running from 11am to 10.30pm daily. Cúirt is out and about with launches, seminars and readings in many venues, including National University of Ireland Galway, the famed Taibhdhearc Theatre, the Cellar Bar, BarCuba, as well as the Galway Arts Centre itself, home to a rich literary heritage; we'll even get as far as Castlerea Prison, Co. Roscommon as part of our outreach programme and to Annaghvane in Connemara and Annaghdown on the shores of Lough Corrib.

There is an added emphasis on drama this year with productions by Joe Taylor and Malcolm Douglas, presenting their cult RTÉ Radio *Tribunals* enactment to the Cúirt audience; the complementary *Red Lorry Yellow Lorry*, a new Galway Youth Theatre production imagining a futuristic Ireland engulfed by landfill; Footsbarn and Macnas lynchpin Rod Goodall's marvellous *An Evening with Samuel Johnson* bringing the legend to life and Galway Youth Theatre's daring 24-hour theatre experiment, asking four playwrights to each devise and stage a 20 minute piece in a frenetic relay race of creativity.

Following the success of last year's Cúirt events in the Aran Islands, **Cúirt Cois Farraige** will take place in Annaghvane, Connemara, on the final day of the Festival, featuring a programme of Irish and Scots Gaelic readers, sean nós singing and much more. The festival writer-inresidence this year is the dynamic Belfast poet Gearóid Mac Lochlainn, currently Writer-in-Residence in Irish at the University Of Ulster whose work has been described by *The Irish Times* as "performance poetry for the 21st century" and has met with glowing critical acclaim. Gearóid will be taking part in the *Corrib Princess* and Annaghvane trips, as well as documenting the festivities.

In keeping with the theme of exile, we are proud to present Settlement: A Project of the Culture and Conflict Group as our Cúirt visual art exhibition in Galway Arts Centre. This exhibition brings together the work of ten artists from Palestine, Ireland and the United States and was first mounted in Chicago at the end of 2002. It explores the impact and effects of military occupation, faltering attempts at settlement, and the importance of history and memory. The group was formed in 1998 and focuses on the intersection between art and politics in contemporary society.

We are ever grateful to our sponsors. It is because of the individuals and companies who endorse the festival with active sponsorship that Cúirt is able to maintain its high standards, especially in light of the recent arts funding cuts. Their names are proudly listed in this brochure and we are sincerely grateful to them.

We are conscious of the legacy of the many, many people who have championed and worked for Cúirt since its inception in 1985 and their input is still greatly valued by those of us involved in Cúirt 2003. Our advisory panel for this year's festival, Rita Ann Higgins, James Joyce, John Kenny, Mike McCormack, Micheál Ó Conghaile and Jonathan Williams, are the people to be thanked for the rich and exotic programme contained within these covers. Their painstaking input is expertly managed by Maura Kennedy, who has succeeded in coordinating all the disparate strands into a coherent whole.

Norma Flaherty deserves special thanks for her efforts in making Cúirt Cois Farraige feasible. Norma, Ann-Kathrin Meyer, Molly Molloy, Michael Dempsey, Siobhan Singleton, Mattie Hynes, Anna Lynch and Vicky McCormack of Galway Arts Centre all deserve praise for their support and work for Cúirt 2003. Galway Youth Theatre's Andrew Flynn and Sonja Brodie are to be thanked for their usual enthusiasm and Pete Mullineaux for his sterling work on all the Poetry Slams which lead to the Cúirt Poetry Grand Slam. We would also like to express our gratitude to the Board Members of Galway Arts Centre, who give their expertise and time so generously.

Finally, we are happy to bring you a new initiative to complement Cúirt this year: **The Cúirt Annual**, containing new Irish writing from submissions to Galway Arts Centre's literary journal, *west47*, and new unpublished work by the Cúirt 2003 participants, will be launched on the opening night of Cúirt, available from Charlie Byrne's Cúirt Bookshop in the Town Hall Theatre foyer and will be a staple of the festival from 2003 on.

The 2003 festival kicks off in the Aula Maxima, National University of Ireland, Galway. Join in the celebrations marking the 18th Cuirt International Festival of Literature, bringing together writers from home and from as far away as China, California, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria and Jamaica. The festival is delighted to welcome our launch speaker Professor William A. Schabas, Director of the Irish Centre for Human Rights at the National University of Ireland, Galway, where he also holds the chair in human rights law. He is a member of the Sierra Leone Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the author of twelve books dealing in whole or in part with international human rights law, including The Abolition of the Death Penalty in International Law and Slobodan Milosevic on Trial.

### **Carol Ann Duffy and Douglas Dunn**

Born in Glasgow, Carol Ann Duffy grew up in Stafford in England and attended the University of Liverpool. She lived for several years in London before moving North again on the birth of daughter, Ella. The Salmon Carol Ann Duffy is a selection from five books as well as new work. Her flawless control of her craft is as evident in Standing Female Nude (1985) as it is in Feminine Gospels (2002) - there are the same clean and poised lines, the uncluttered language, the laconic tone, the humour, always present, veering from the melancholy to the acerbic. She currently lives in Manchester and her recent publications include Queen Munch and Queen Nibble (MacMillan, 2002) for children.

Douglas Dunn was born in Renfrewshire in 1942 and worked as a librarian before becoming a freelance writer in 1971. His first book was Terry Street (1969); subsequent collections include Elegies (1985) and New Selected Poems 1964 - 2000. He lives in Fife, is a short-story writer, a translator, an anthologist, and Professor of English at the University of St Andrew's. Dunn's poetry addresses local concerns from a profitable point of privacy, viewing the cosmos through his concerns with class, power and history. His appearance of seclusion allows him the freedom to ramble in and out of side streets, making small details matter with his love of the exact. He holds a tight rein on language and the tension created makes a slip-gig on the page.

Ó Chorca Dhuibhne **Pádraig Ó Cíobháin**. Tá sé ina Scríbhneoir Cónaitheach Gaeilge in Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh faoi láthair. Pádraig is a novelist and short story writer. His first collection of stories Le Gealaigh (Moonstruck) was published in 1991. Hitherto he has written seven books, alternating between short stories and novels, including Tá Solas ná hÉagann Choíche (There's a Light that never goes out) and Faightear Gach Laoch in Aisce (Immortal Heroes). His most recent work is a Galway based novel - Ré an Charbaid (The Chariot Course).

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### Forum - "The Third Zone of Literature": Writing between Cultures

In his introduction to Azeri poet Negar's Russian language collection, On Wings Over the Horizon, Reza Baraheni, the President of Canadian Center International PEN and himself an Azeri, speaks of the "third zone of literature" wherein such writers as himself and Negar exist. This position, provocatively summed up by Negar - "the likes of me are for exile and burning" - will be discussed by our panel poets Negar, Bejan Matur, Ziba Karbassi and their translators Richard McKane, Ruth Christie and Stephen Watts. Hugo Hamilton will discuss the writing of his autobiography, The Speckled People, which examines his upbringing in an Irish-German household. The discussion will be chaired by William Schabas, Professor of Human Rights Law and Director of the Irish Centre for Human Rights, NUI, Galway.

# Joan McBreen and Bejan Matur

Born in Sligo, now living in Tuam, County Galway, Joan McBreen's first poetry collection was The Wind Beyond the Wall (Story Line Press, 1990). Awarded an MA Degree from University College, Dublin in 1997, she compiled and edited The White Page - An Bhileog Bhán: Twentieth Century Irish Women Poets (Salmon 1999, 2000, 2001), a vital contribution to Irish women's literary history. She will read from Winter in the Eye-New and Selected Poems (Salmon).

Though she currently writes in Turkish, Bejan Matur was born in 1968 in the Kurdish region of eastern Turkey. Having qualified as a lawyer, she published her first poetry with Mansions Full of Breezes (1996). Her singular and emotive work, which frequently concentrates on the rural life of the Kurdish regions, continued with God Must Not See My Letters (1999). In 2002 she published In his desert and Sons reared by the moon. Periodically resident in Istanbul, Matur is also a film-maker.

### Book Launch - Hugo Hamilton's The Speckled People (Fourth Estate)

Born in 1953 in Dublin, **Hugo Hamilton** was raised by a sometimes brutal Irish nationalist father who allowed his children to speak only Gaelic and a German emigrant mother, marked by a Nazi past, who spoke to them only in German. *The Speckled People* is a story of homesickness, a mother's for a homeland she has left behind, a father's for an Ireland that isn't available to him, a child's, Hugo, for a home he can call his own.

### **Richard McKane and Negar**

4pm | Town Hall Theatre | Admission €6/4

Richard McKane was born in Melbourne, Australia of British parents in 1947. He has translated over twenty books from both Russian and Turkish, amongst them Akhmatova and Mandelstam, Hikmet and Rifat. Due this spring is his Ten Russian Poets, Surviving the 20th Century, a groundbreaking anthology where startling new poets are presented for the first time. The first collection of his own poetry, Amphora for Metaphors, appeared in 1993 followed by Poet for Poet, translations and new work in 1998. His recent poems have been published in Turkey entitled Coffeehouse Poems. Whilst continuing to translate, he also works as an interpreter at the Medical Foundation for the Care of Victims of Torture in London. The youngest member of the Azerbaijani Union of Writers, Negar was born in Baku in 1975. Negar's work, written in Russian, is majestic, enriched by these two fascinating cultures yoked to each other politically and imaginatively. Her stunning collection, On Wings Over the Horizon, was translated in 2002 by Richard McKane and reveals a powerful poetic imagination, made even more remarkable by the author's youth.

#### Book Launch - Peter Phillips' Humanity Dick: The Eccentric Member for Galway (Parapress)

Peter Phillips is 45 and lives with his four children on a farm in his native Glamorgan, Wales. After a successful career in the fields of corporate finance and PR he now concentrates on writing and broadcasting. The lasting legacy of Richard Martin (Humanity Dick) is his pioneering animal rights law of 1822, although as a young man he enjoyed the reputation of being Ireland's most notorious duellist. A Protestant landowner in Connemara, he spent a 50-year political career fighting for Catholic emancipation. This biography reveals many colourful aspects of his extraordinary life.

# Keith Ridgway and Andrew O'Hagan

**Keith Ridgway** is from Dublin. His novella *Horses* appeared in 1997 and was followed in 1998 by his critically acclaimed first novel, *The Long Falling*, which has since been awarded both the prestigious Prix Femina Etranger and the Premier Roman Etranger in France. In 2001 his short story collection *Standard Time* was awarded The Rooney Prize. His new novel *The Parts* is published by Faber & Faber. He lives in London.

Andrew O'Hagan was born in Glasgow in 1968. He grew up in Ayrshire on Scotland's west coast. An acclaimed journalist, his first book, The Missing, was named 'an international book of the year' in the Times Literary Supplement and his first novel, Our Fathers, was shortlisted for the 1999 Booker Prize, the IMPAC Award and the Whitbread Award. His extraordinary new novel, Personality, is a piercing examination of the cult of celebrity explored against a background of the Italian experience in Scotland. Maria Tambini is a young girl from the Scottish island of Bute whose remarkable singing voice shoots her from her family home above a chip shop to national stardom through a TV talent show. O'Hagan vividly traces her rise and fall as she struggles to survive in a world where, as Hughie Green explains, 'talent conquers everything'. Andrew O'Hagan has been named as one of Granta's Best of Young British Novelists 2003.

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

### **Anne Kennedy Memorial Lecture** with Ed Moloney

**8.30pm** | Town Hall Theatre | Admission €10/8

Ed Moloney is the author of the bestselling and widely acclaimed Secret History of the IRA (2002). He has been Northern Editor of The Irish Times and The Sunday Tribune. He co-authored a celebrated biography of the Rev. Ian Paisley and has written for a wide range of newspapers, including The Washington Post, The Economist, The Guardian, the New Statesman and a variety of Irish publications. In 1999, he successfully defeated an attempt by Scotland Yard Commissioner Sir John Stevens to force him to hand over notes of an interview with a source who alleged an official cover-up of the murder of a Belfast solicitor. In that year he was elected Irish Journalist of the Year. He lives in New York. Frank Millar of The Irish Times said of The Secret History of the IRA: "This dramatic book ... spectacularly combines Mr Moloney's celebrated talent as expert reporter and serious analyst with some of the ingredients of a Le Carré." The subject of the Memorial Lecture is "The North: A Settled Conflict".

### **Biography:** Paul O'Brien's Shelley and Revolutionary Ireland

Paul O'Brien was born in Dublin in 1946. A literary critic, he published Shelley and Revolutionary Ireland (Redwords) in 2002. Shelley's engagement with Ireland is one of the great untold stories in literature, one that reaches back to the French Revolution of 1789, the United Irishmen in 1798 and especially Robert Emmet, whom Shelley admired above all. According to Tom Paulin "Percy Shelley was a devoted and courageous advocate of Irish freedom. His poetry and prose had a seminal influence on Shaw, Joyce and O'Casey, as Paul O'Brien shows in his lively and exciting study of the Promethean radical poet, who was spied on by the government when he visited Ireland and who narrowly escaped being murdered by a political opponent on his return to Britain." Don't miss this chance to meet the radical Shelley.

### Gabriel Rosenstock and Cevat Çapan

Gabriel Rosenstock was born in Kilfinane, East Limerick, in 1949 of an Irish mother and German father. Author/ translator of over 100 books, he works with the Irishlanguage publishing house, An Gúm. Active in many fields, as well as being a member of Aosdána, he is a member of the Irish Writers' Union, Honorary Life Member of the Irish Translators' and Interpreters' Association, a member of the World Haiku Association and World Haiku Club. His reading will include work from his new volume, Eachtraí Krishnamurphy, to be launched directly after the reading. Cevat Çapan was born in Anatolia in 1933. He is recognised on the streets of Istanbul, thanks to his role as an avuncular writer in a popular Turkish soap opera. Çapan's work as poet and translator of English, American, Greek and Russian poetry expresses the bridging point of cultures and traditions symbolised by Turkey's cosmopolitan heritage. His first book, Irlanda Tiyatrosunda Gercekcilik, (Realism in Irish Drama) was published in 1966; Capan's 2001 collection, Where Are You, Susie Petschek?, with an introduction by his Cambridge contemporary, A S Byatt, poignantly articulates the theme of this year's festival - exile - in its many guises, cultural, political and imaginative.

### Ziba Karbassi and Stephen Watts

Ziba Karbassi was born in Tabriz, northwestern Iran, and started writing poetry from the age of nine. She and her family were forced to leave their country in the mid-1980s and came to Britain as political refugees. In exile she quickly became recognised as one of the foremost young Iranian poets and this reputation has been strengthened by her four books in Persian, Scorpion Under The Pillow (1996), With A Broken Star In My Heart (1998), The Sea Will Drown (1999) and Jizzz (2002). Her poetry has an astonishingly open and fertile lyricism and she writes with great personal and political honesty and courage. She has given many readings in Britain and the rest of Europe, and in North America, and her work has been translated into English, Polish, German, French, Swedish and Dutch.

Stephen Watts was born in 1952 and has strong cultural attachments to the Italian Alps where his mother's family came from. He has lived in the Outer Hebrides and the East End of London and has published The Lava's Curl (1990 and new edition 2002). He co-edited Voices Of Conscience (1995), Mother Tongues (2001) and Music While Drowning (2003). His Gramsci and Caruso: Selected Poems is due to be published in 2003 and three long-poem chapbooks are being published separately in spring 2003. He has worked for Multicultural Arts Consortium in London and has organised many multilingual poetry readings. His Bibliography of 20th Century Poetry In English Translation is also due to be published before the end of 2003, and his own poetry has been translated into Spanish, Czech and Persian. He has also written prose and is collaborating on two experimental videos concerning home and migration. Ziba Karbassi and Stephen Watts are working together on translations of their poetry respectively into English and into Persian.

Bei Dao was born in Beijing in 1949. Considered by many to be China's foremost living poet, he has lived in exile since the Tiananmen Square massacare in 1989. His collections include The August Sleepwalker (1988), Old Snow (1991), Forms of Distance (1994), Landscape Over Zero (1996) and Unlock (2000). Bei Dao is an honorary member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. He currently lives in California.

Born in Ankara in 1935, Moris Farhi graduated from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in 1956, becoming a British citizen in 1964. After working as an actor and scriptwriter, he devoted himself to novels and poetry. His last two novels are Journey Through the Wilderness and the prizewinning Children of the Rainbow. He served as Chair of International PEN Writers in Prison Committee from 1997 to 2000. He remains an active campaigner in the field both as an International Vice President and as a member of English PEN's Writers in Prison Committee. André Brink was born in a small village in South Africa's Orange Free State in 1935. His novels – several of which were written in Afrikaans and then translated into English - include A Dry White Season and the Booker-nominated Rumours of Rain (1978). Mapmakers (1983) is a selection of his political writings and his new novel The Other Side of Silence (2002) was described by Eileen Battersby of The Irish Times as "an astonishing performance". Siobhán Ní Shúilleabháin was born in the Corca Dhuibhne Gaeltacht in Kerry in 1928. She is now living in Galway and is married with six children. Her first publication was a novel for teenagers entitled Triúr Againn, and was published in 1955. Her writings include plays, short stories, novels and poetry. Her latest publication is Marach an Phóg san, which was published in 2002. Born in Moycullen, Co. Galway in 1942, Pádraic Breathnach is a lecturer in Irish in Mary Immaculate College at the University of Limerick. Probably the most prolific short story writer in Irish, having published over 150 such compositions to date, including Bean Aonair (1974) and As na Cúlacha (1998), he is renowned as a stylist, nature lover and for his depiction of youth.

This upheaval has lead Kassabova "to construct [her] own history in order to live", a complex history drawn from what she perceives to be the cynicism and disillusionment of her native literature and the naiveté of Western writing. Her first poetry collection, All Roads Lead to the Sea (Auckland University Press) appeared in 1997, followed by a novel, Reconnaissance, in 1999. Her new collection, Someone Else's Life, will be published in April by Bloodaxe Books.

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

The Cúirt Debate - "Imagining Harmony": The Responsibility of Art Chaired by Mark Little with Ariel Dorfman, Shane Cullen, Daisy Zamora, Lara Marlowe and Michael D Higgins TD

The Cúirt Debate will this year examine the question posed by **Ariel Dorfman's** provocative *Guardian* article, "A Different Drum": "Is it possible that the peace everybody proclaims as desirable is in fact so elusive on our planet precisely because as humans we are much better at imagining discord than at imagining harmony?" Is the function of the artist to provide imaginative empathy or, as William Gaddis had it, if you keep an open mind will your brains fall out? Has the imaginative imperative of the artist been replaced by moral superiority?

A fascinating panel including Dorfman; visual artist **Shane Cullen**, whose work is on display during the festival as part of the *Settlement* exhibition highlighting the occupation of Palestine; **Lara Marlowe**, Paris correspondent of *The Irish Times* and an expert on Middle Eastern affairs; Nicaraguan poet and political activist **Daisy Zamora**; and outspoken anti-war campaigner, the Labour Party's **Michael D Higgins TD** will discuss these issues. The debate will be chaired by **Mark Little** who was appointed RTÉ's first Washington correspondent in 1995. He returned to Ireland in 2001, at the end of the Clinton presidency, to become RTÉ's Foreign Affairs correspondent and presenter of *Primetime*. He has won two National Media awards for his work, including Television Journalist of the Year.

# Cúirt Debut: Ger Hanberry and Nuala Ní Chonchúir

Rough Night, Ger Hanberry's first collection of poetry was published in May 2002 by Stonebridge Publications. An English teacher and musician, he is working on a second collection of poetry as well as prose fiction. She has taken part in Poetry Ireland's Introductions Series of readings and been nominated for a Hennessy Award for fiction; Ní Chonchúir won the 2002 Francis Mac Manus Award for her short story *The Wind Across The Grass.* A first poetry collection *Molly's Daughter* appears this spring from Arlen House and she is also working on translating the poetry of Caitlín Maude from Irish to English.

### **Daisy Zamora and George Evans**

During the revolution in Nicaragua, the poet **Daisy Zamora** was a combatant in the National Sandinista Liberation Front (FSLN), the voice of the clandestine Radio Sandino and later served as the Vice-Minister of Culture. As most recently evinced by *The Violent Foam* (2002), she is widely regarded as one of the most vital political and personal poetic voices in Latin America.

San Francisco writer **George Evans** is the author of five poetry books published in the USA and England, most recently *The New World* (Curbstone Press, 2002). Recipient of many literary awards, he has also published two volumes of contemporary poetry translations. A veteran of the Vietnam American War, his internationally published writings are those of a longtime antiwar activist, advocate for the homeless, and promoter of social change.

The workshop will be a relaxed exploration of poetry and space, in which the participants are encouraged to explore and unfold spoken and written words and the drawn line. As we make in art we inevitably come up against failure, and this we transform, moving through doubt, to faith.

### Bardic Breakfast with Tim Lyons and Little John Nee

Celebrate the week's event with two of Ireland's finest bards, **Little John Nee** and **Tim Lyons**, along with guest performers. An incomparable bard, Tim Lyons ranges from lilting, or "mouth music", to Scottish and Irish traditional music to the comic and satirical songs he has written with Fintan Vallely as part of Scitheredee. Little John Nee's magnetic performances have garnered him an international reputation, not least for his original play, *The Derry Boat*, telling of the vagabond life between Donegal and Scotland. With a witty mixture of song and the spoken word, Little John brings the bardic tradition to life. There will be music and craic and BarCuba's legendary brunch to revive veterans of Cúirt week.

### Cúirt Drama Discussion with Christian O'Reilly, John Carney and Eilish Kent

Tension is a vital part of good theatre; imagine taking away the safety net of previews, technical run-throughs and four weeks rehearsal; then strip away a script that has been developed and written over time. What you're left with is 24-hour theatre!

As the final event of the Cúirt Literary Festival, Galway Youth Theatre will attempt just that. Four writers will work independently for twelve hours to create four short plays. 

Jackie will read from his new collection along with fellow poet Rody Gorman. Gorman was born in Dublin in 1960 and now lives on the Isle of Skye. He writes in Irish and Scottish Gaelic and his collections span Fax in 1996 to Naomhóga na Laoi in 2003. Gorman was Writer-in-Residence in Sabhal Mòr Ostaig 1998-2001 and University College Cork in 2002.

#### **Pádraic Breathnach and Anne Frater**

Probably the most prolific short story writer in Irish, having published over 150 such compositions to date, **Padraic Breathnach** was born in Moycullen, Co. Galway. Now a lecturer in Irish in Mary Immaculate College at the University of Limerick, he is a novelist, essayist and short story writer and is renowned as a stylist and nature lover and for his depiction of youth. His published works have been translated into English and other European languages and include *Bean Aonair* (1974); *Taomanna* (booklet & cassette) and *Cúlacha* (1998). **Anne Frater** comes from Bayble, Isle of Lewis and is an authority on early Gaelic women's poetry. Her debut collection, *Fon t-Slige*, appeared in 1995 and she has published widely since.

The duo **Skipinnish** comprises accordionist Angus MacPhail from the island of Tiree and piper Andrew Stevenson from the Highland village of Achnacarry, a partnership dedicated to their roots in the piping and Highland tradition. These boys are the real thing, their immense popularity stemming from the combination of musical virtuosity and flare. Having travelled the Highlands and Islands they are bringing their storming set to the Connemara audience.

Bréag was formed in Belfast in 1993 and released a demo in that same year which, after much radio airplay and rigorous touring, earned them a strong fan base in Ireland and beyond. Nineteen ninety-five saw the release of their first album Jah san jungal and suddenly Bréag found themselves taking part on television documentaries on BBC, RTE and TG4. After the release of their second album Gan Jah in 1998, taking part in numerous festivals, they supported Shane McGowan, Bad Manners, Alabama 3 and The Wailers. They played in the Basque Country, Switzerland and Sri Lanka and are currently working on a new album due to be released this summer. Bréag is a seven-piece band and their music is a fusion of reggae/ska, Irish traditional and other world musics, with lyrics as Gaeilge.

### Settlement

#### A Project of the Culture and Conflict Group

**Settlement:** A Project of the Culture and Conflict Group brings together the work of ten artists from Palestine, Ireland and the United States.

The exhibition will explore the impact and effects of military occupation, faltering attempts at settlement, and the importance of history and memory in both regions, drawing comparisons and parallels where necessary. This project acknowledges that artists are not 'neutral' beings divorced from social and political realities, but often hold partisan viewpoints which are articulated through numerous and complex strategies.

The Culture and Conflict Group was formed in 1998 with the intent to explore the intersection between art and politics in contemporary society and to challenge the assumption that art is neutral in any given context.

The members include Jackie Salloum, Cynthia Large, Meir Gal, Kevin Noble, Frankie Quinn, Shane Cullen, Sheila Mangan, Conor McGrady, Ayreen Anastas and Emily Jacir.

Public space, such as that which is characterized through the format of the exhibition, is often shaped through debate and conflicting views. It is the aim of this exhibition to forge public space by raising questions on issues of history, war and representation. Through focusing on the work of the 'other', the colonized and the dispossessed, we hope to broaden out the scope of debate through the presentation of alternative viewpoints.
