Dr Robyn Rowland AO, is an Irish-Australian poet who splits her time between Connemara and Australia each year. She has published nine books, six of poetry, most recently *Seasons of Doubt & Burning*. *New & Selected Poems* (2010) representing 40 years of poetry. Her poetry has recently appeared in *Being Human*, ed. Neil Astley, (Bloodaxe Books, UK, 2011). *Silence & its Tongues* (2006, reprinted 2008, 2009) was shortlisted for the 2007 ACT Judith Wright Poetry Prize. Robyn is winner of, among others, the Writing Spirit Poetry Award, Ireland 2010. She is a Honorary Fellow of the School of Culture and Communication, University of Melbourne and curates and presents the Poetry & Conversation Series for the Geelong Library Corporation.



Lynn Saoirse is an award-winning Irish harpist living in Connemara. She has recorded four solo albums as well as being a featured artist on three other recordings. She has performed throughout Europe, the US, the Caribbean, Nepal, Argentina and Egypt. Her harp arrangements of both traditional and contemporary Irish music are very highly regarded.

Silver Leaving: Poems & Harp Portumna Castle, Sunday 22nd April, 3pm

Following the bardic tradition of harp and spoken word, this is a

collaboration between two fine artists; a partnership of lyric with music; an often haunting recording, full of deep emotion. Longing and love, history and hope, weave their magic into and out of a strongly present landscape.

This will be an intercultural concert of traditional song in the Irish and Galician languages. Translators and musicians who have worked on a number of songs in Irish and Galician will perform them for the first time. The experiment has been carried out by the Spanish and Irish Departments in NUIG who have explored song translation and the relationship between sean nós and traditional Galician songs. In addition, the noted Galician performer Marco Velez, will give an introduction to Galician music.

While travelling through the west of Ireland, William Hamilton Maxwell documented stories and experiences in his book Wild Sports of the West, published in 1832. It was one of these stories that inspired Dara McGee to put together a visual show recounting the fate of a domesticated seal at the home of a local fisherman at Renvyle, Connemara. Music, storytelling and live art are used in this show to tell the sad story of The Blind Seal. Renowned musician Vinnie Kilduff provides the musical score with Darach Ó Tuairisg relaying the story and Dara McGee painting live on stage.



PAUL DURCAN

Born in Dublin in 1944. Paul Durcan is one of Ireland's foremost poets. His first book, Endsville (1967), has been followed by more than twenty others, including The Berlin Wall Café (a Poetry Book Society Choice in 1985), Daddy (winner of the Whitbread Award for Poetry in 1990), A Snail in My Prime: New and Selected Poems (1993), Cries of an Irish Caveman: New Poems (2001), The Art of Life (2004) and The Laughter of Mothers (2008). In 2009, he published a selection of his work from the previous forty years in one volume: Life is a Dream.

In 2001, Paul received a Cholmondeley Award. He was the Ireland Professor of Poetry 2004-2007 and in 2009 he was conferred with an honorary degree by Trinity College, Dublin. He is a member of Aosdána.

RITA ANN HIGGINS

Rita Ann Higgins was born in Galway in 1955. She has published nine collections of poetry including Sunny Side Plucked (1996, which was a Poetry Book Society Recommendation), An Awful Racket (2001), Ireland Is Changing Mother (2011) from Bloodaxe and Hurting God: Prose & Poems (2010) from Salmon. First published in 2005, her Bloodaxe retrospective Throw in the Vowels: New & Selected Poems was reissued in 2010 with an audio CD of her reading the poems. Her latest collection, Ireland is Changing Mother, was published by Bloodaxe in September 2011. Rita is a member of Aosdána



ANNE KENNEDY MEMORIAL LECTURE With Professor Gearóid Ó Tuathaigh

As Ireland enters a decade of anniversaries of pivotal events from its recent history (notably the several centenaries of the events from the revolutionary decade 1912-22), the issue of who determines what historical events should be commemorated, and in what manner, will likely excite public debate. What role should professional historians take in this debate? Is it inevitable that the historian's scruple for evidence and complexity in historical explanation will always be at odds with the confident, affirming terms in which 'public history' is widely understood, and in which the State will generally seek to dress its public anniversaries and commemorations?



GEARÓID Ó TUATHAIGH

Gearóid Ó Tuathaigh is Professor Emeritus in History at NUI, Galway. His numerous publications, in English and Irish, have mainly related to modern Irish and British history and to issues in the historical process of cultural change. He has also been a frequent commentator in recent decades on aspects of public policy, culture and broadcasting in Ireland.



LINDA SPALDING

Linda Spalding was born in Kansas and lived in Hawaii before immigrating to Toronto in 1982. She is the author of three novels, *Daughters* of Captain Cook, The Paper Wife, and Mere, which she wrote with her daughter, Esta. Her non-fiction work, *The Follow*, was short-listed for the Trillium Book Award and the Pearson Writers' Trust Non-Fiction Prize. Who Named the Knife, her most recent work, is a memoir



of crime and punishment. She is an editor of *Brick*, A Journal of Reviews and has been awarded the Harbourfront Festival Prize for her contribution to the Canadian literary community. *The Purchase*, a novel, will be published in Canada in the fall of 2012 by McClelland & Stewart.



GEOFFREY TAYLOR

Geoffrey Taylor is the current Director of the International Festival of Authors at the Harbourfront Centre, Toronto, Canada. He is an advisor for the Humber School of Creative Writing and has served as a jury member for the Toronto Arts Council, Toronto Arts Awards and the Amazon First Novel Award. In 2003, he was the inaugural recipient of the Order of the Forest for his extraordinary contribution towards building an ancient-forest friendly book-publishing community. In 2006, he received the Jack Award, which is presented by

the Book Promoters' Association of Canada in recognition of an individual's s ignificant contribution to the promotion of Canadian books and authors. In 2008, Quill and Quire named him one of the 30 most influential people in Canadian publishing. This event is sponsored by The Association for Canadian Studies in Ireland.

LAUNCH OF JESSICA CASEY & OTHER WORKS BY AWAY WITH WORDS

way with Words is an innovative creative writing project which enables people with intellectual disabilities to share in the arts life of their community. Set up as a partnership between the Brothers of Charity Services and local writers, Away With Words hosts workshops where participants can explore their voices as writers in a supportive setting. Jessica Casey & Other Works is Away with Words' first publication. The story of Jessica Casey is the fruit of collaborative writing workshops at the Duirling Centre in Connemara, facilitated by Mary Madec. The work brings us into the funny, phantasmagoric world of a young woman on the threshold of the adult world. The other works showcase the output of workshops in Gort, Galway and Connemara, including the winning poems from the Inclusion Ireland Poetry Awards 2011.

This work gives us a true insight into the lives of these authors and what they find interesting and amusing about the world around them. This publication includes a wonderful animation of Jessica Casey, which the Away With Words writers at the Duirling Centre developed in collaboration with visual artist Aideen Barry. This animation will be shown in the main auditorium of the Town Hall at 5pm, followed by the book launch and reception upstairs in the Town Hall Bar.

GEARÓID MAC LOCHLAINN

Gearóid Mac Lochlainn was born in Belfast in 1966. His last collection of poetry, *Sruth Teangacha / Stream of Tongues*, with translations in English, received awards nationally and internationally, and selections of his work have been translated into several languages. He has been Writer-in-Residence at the University of Ulster and Queen's University, Belfast, and a fellow with the William Joiner Center for the Study of War and Social Consequences (University of Massachusetts, Boston.)

MARK BRAIDNER

Mark Braidner from Belfast has a deep passion for the acoustic blues made popular during the 1920s and 1930s by such artists as Blind Blake, Skip James and Bukka White. His mastery of styles ranges from ragtime and hokum to down-home slide played on either acoustic or national steel guitars.

The book was nominated for the Norwegian Book Sellers' Prize and won the Tarjei Vesaas First Book Prize (judged by The Literary Council of The Norwegian Authors' Union). The rights for The Faster I Walk, the Smaller I Am have been sold in English, Bulgarian, Danish, German, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Swedish.

The National Theatre (Oslo) will produce a play based on the novel in 2013. Skomsvold studied mathematics and computer science at the University of Oslo and at the University for Science and Technology in Trondheim. Subsequently, she attended the Writers Class at the Nansen School in Lillehammer and completed studies at the Academy of Writing in Bergen. She has also studied literature at the University of Oslo and French at Université de Caen, France. She is currently living in Paris.



LARS IYER

In a raucous debut novel (*Spurious*) that summons up Britain's fabled Goon Show comedies, writer and philosopher Lars Iyer tells the story of someone very like himself with a "slightly more successful" friend and their journeys in search of more palatable literary conferences where they serve better gin. Another reason for their journeys: the narrator's home is slowly being taken over by a fungus that no on seems to know what to do about. Before it completely swallows his house, the narrator feels compelled to solve some major philosophical questions

(such as "Why?") and the meaning of his urge to write, as well as the source of the fungus... before it's too late...or, he has to move.

Lars Iyer is a lecturer in philosophy at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne. He is the author of two books on Blanchot (*Blanchot's Communism: Art, Philosophy, Politics and Blanchot's Vigilance: Phenomenology, Literature, Ethics*) and is also a contributor to Britain's leading literary blog, Ready, Steady, Book. Hailed by *The Guardian* as 'A tiny marvel of comically repetitive gloomery.... A wonderfully monstrous creation', *Spurious* by Lars Iyer was shortlisted for the Not-The-Booker-Prize 2011. His debut novel forms part one of a trilogy. The second instalment of the series, *Dogma*, was published in February 2012.

His latest novel, *Lazurus is Dead* (2011), re-imagines the life of Lazurus, from youth to resurrection and beyond.

After studying at Cambridge, Richard Beard worked in Hong Kong, Oxford and Paris. In 1995 he completed a Creative Writing MA at the University of East Anglia. MANUEL RIVAS AND KIRMEN URIBE IN DISCUSSION WITH JONATHAN DUNNE:

Two of Spain's most prominent literary voices talk about their Galician and Basque roots, the importance of minority languages and the exportation of Spanish literature.



MANUEL RIVAS

Manuel Rivas was born in A Coruña, Galicia in 1957. He is a Galician writer, poet and journalist who began his career writing for Spanish newspapers such as *El Ideal Gallego*, *La Voz de Galicia* and *El Pais*. Rivas writes in the Galician language of north-west Spain and is a poet, novelist, short story writer and essayist. Rivas is considered a revolutionary in contemporary Galician literature. O Lápis do Carpinteiro, or The Carpenter's Pencil in English, has been published in nine countries and is the most widely translated work in the history of Galician literature. Rivas's book Que me quieres, amor? (1996), a series of 16 short stories, was adapted by director Jose Luis Cuerda for his film, La lengua de las mariposas (Butterfly). His best known books in English are: The Carpenter's Pencil (1998), In the Wilderness (2004), From Unknown to Unknown (2009) and Books Burn Badly (2010).

'Manuel Rivas writes in Galician, the least known of Spain's official languages. Franco's repression of the four regional languages ended up doing a great deal to stimulate their revival, and Rivas chooses to write in Galician even if not all his characters would have spoken it, even if it means his work's literary life will be led mostly in translation'. -The London Review of Books



KIRMEN URIBE

Kirmen Uribe was born in Ondarroa, Spain. He studied Basque Philology at the University of the Basque Country, Gasteiz and did his graduate studies in Comparative Literature in Trento, Italy. In October 2009 he was awarded the Spanish Literature Prize for his novel *Bilbao–New York–Bilbao*. For the same work he had received the 2008 Critics' Prize for a novel written in Basque. He has participated in a number of international literary festivals including: New York's PEN World Voices Festival, the Berlin International Poetry



Festival and The Havana International Poetry Festival. He has given lectures and led seminars at Stanford, Brown, New York University, California Institute of the Arts, University of California-San Diego and the University of Warsaw. His poetry collection *Meanwhile Take My Hand* (2001) received the Critics Prize for poetry written in Basque and its first edition sold out within a month. The book has since been translated into Spanish, French, English, Catalan, Russian and was a finalist for the 2008 PEN Award for Poetry in Translation, which recognizes the best book of poetry in translation published in the United States in the previous year.

JONATHAN DUNNE

Jonathan Dunne is the editor and main translator of an Anthology of Galician Literature published in two volumes: 1196-1981 and (forthcoming) 1981-2011. He edited and translated a supplement of *Contemporary Galician Poets for the winter* 2010 issue of *Poetry Review*. His translations of fiction and poetry by Manuel Rivas have been nominated for the International IMPAC Award, the Oxford-Weidenfeld Prize and the Popescu Prize for Poetry in Translation. He also translates from Spanish, Catalan and Bulgarian. He has published two books: a poetry collection, *Even Though That*, and a study of English word connections, *The DNA of the English Language*. Jonathan also directs the publishing house Small Stations Press: www.smallstations.com.

BILLY COLLINS

Billy Collins (born William James Collins March 22, 1941) is an American poet, appointed as Poet Laureate of the United States from 2001 to 2003. He has been called "The most popular poet in America" by The New York Times and in 2005 Collins was the first annual recipient of its Mark Twain Prize for Humor in Poetry. He has published over a dozen collections of poetry including: Pokerface (1977), Taking Off Emily Dickinson's Clothes (2000), Nine Horses (2002), Ballistics (2008) and Horoscopes for the Dead (2011). He is a Distinguished Professor at Lehman College of the City University of New York and is the Senior Distinguished Fellow of the Winter Park Institute, Florida. Collins was recognized as a Literary Lion of the New York Public Library (1992) and was selected as the New York State Poet for 2004-2006





TESS GALLAGHER

Tess Gallagher was born in 1943 in Port Angeles, Washington. She received a BA and MA from the University of Washington, where she studied creative writing with Theodore Roethke and a MFA from the University of Iowa. Her first collection of poems, *Instructions to the Double*, won the 1976 Elliston Book Award for "best book of poetry published by a small press". She has published nine volumes of poetry including *Midnight Lantern: New and Selected Poems* (2012) *Dear Ghosts* (2006); *Owl-Spirit Dwelling* (1994) and Moon Crossing Bridge (1992).

Distant Rain, published in 2006, is a conversation between Tess and Jakuch Setouchi, a Buddhist nun from Kyoto, which took place after the death of her husband, Raymond Carver. Gallagher is also the author of Amplitude, Soul Barnacles: Ten More Years with Ray, A Concert of Tenses: Essays on Poetry, and two collections of short fiction: At the Owl Woman Saloon and The Lover of Horses and Other Stories. She spends time near Lough Arrow in Co. Sligo where many of her new poems are set, and also lives and writes in her hometown of Port Angeles, Washington.

MUSIC AND WORDS

Ronan Browne and Louis de Paor continue to explore the links between music and poetry through performances and recordings that combine spoken work with traditional and contemporary musical settings.

Originally from Dublin but living now in Connemara, Ronan Browne is one of Ireland's leading traditional musicians. A serial collaborator, his work inhabits the boundaries between traditional Irish music and the modern electronic world, ranging from solo projects, to partnerships with Kevin Glackin and Seán Tyrrell, Peter O'Loughlin, CRAN, Róisín Elsafty, and Siobhán Armstrong. Ronan was the original piper with both the Afro Celt Sound System and Riverdance. Louis de Paor has been involved with the contemporary renaissance of poetry in Irish since 1980 when he was first published in the poetry journal *Innti*, which he subsequently edited for a time. A four-times winner of the Oireachtas prize for the best collection of poems in Irish, he lived in Australia from 1987 to 1996. His *Selected Poems* have just been published by Coiscéim.

Kathleen MacMahon is a journalist and writer. After an early childhood in Central and South America, Kathleen grew up in Dublin. She studied History and English at University College Dublin, before going on to take a Master's degree at Cambridge University. She began working for RTE shortly after graduating and spent ten years as a journalist on Morning Ireland and the News at One. She currently reports on foreign news for television.

LyDIA DAVIS Lydia Davis (born 1947 in Massachusetts) is an American story writer, novelist, and translator. She is the author of six collections of stories and one novel, *The End of the Story* (Farrar, Straus & Giroux, 1995) and most recently *The Collected Stories of Lydia Davis* (FSG, 2009, Hamish Hamilton, 2010). She is also the translator of numerous works of avant-garde French literature, including fiction by Maurice Blanchot and the autobiographical essays of Michel Leiris, as well as the Penguin Classic: *Swann's Way* by Marcel Proust (Penguin UK, 2002) and *Madame Bovary* by Gustave Flaubert (Penguin UK, 2010). Among many other honors, she was named a Chevalier of the Order of Arts

and Letters by the French government in 1999 and was awarded a MacArthur Fellowship in 2003. She currently teaches at SUNY Albany and New York University and is working on translations from the Dutch of short stories by A.L. Snijders.

AMY BLOOM

Amy Bloom is the author of two novels, three collections of short stories and was a nominee for both the National Book Award and the National Book Critics Circle Award. Her stories have appeared in Best American Short Stories, Prize Stories: The O. Henry Awards, and numerous anthologies here and abroad. She has written for The New Yorker, The New York Times Magazine, The Atlantic Monthly, among many other publications, and has won a National Magazine Award. YANG LIAN

Yang Lian was one of the original Misty Poets who reacted against the strictures of the Cultural Revolution. Born in Switzerland, the son of a diplomat, he grew up in Beijing and began writing when he was sent to the countryside in the 1970s. On his return he co-founded the influential literary magazine *Jintian* (Currently published in exile in Scandinavia). His work was criticised in China

in 1983 and formally banned in 1989. He has lived in exile since 1989 when he organised memorial services for the dead of Tiananmen while in New Zealand. After spells in Australia, Germany and the USA, he settled in London. Translations of his poetry include three collections with Bloodaxe, *Where the Sea Stands Still* (1999), a Poetry Book Society Recommended Translation, *Concentric Circles* (2005), and *Lee Valley Poems* (2009), as well as *Riding Pisces: Poems from Five Collections* (Shearman, 2008), a compilation of earlier work.



BRIAN HOLTON

Brian Holton was born in Galashiels in the Scottish Border country but grew up partly in Nigeria. He was the son of an Irish father who was bilingual in English and French, fluent in Hausa and West African Pidgin and competent in Yoruba. After being educated in Greek, French and Latin, he studied Chinese at the universities of Edinburgh

and Durham and was the first Programme Director of the Chinese-English/ English-Chinese translation programme at Newcastle University. He taught translation for ten years at the Hong Kong Polytechnic University and in 1992 he began a continuing working relationship with the poet Yang Lian, which has so far resulted in a dozen books of translated poetry. He also translates into Scots and is the only currently-publishing Chinese-Scots translator in the world.



BILL HERBERT

Bill Herbert was born in Dundee and educated at Brasenose College, Oxford. He is Professor of Poetry and Creative Writing at the School of English Literature, Language and Linguistics at Newcastle University. He has published seven volumes of poetry and four pamphlets and is widely anthologised. His last five collections, with Bloodaxe Books, have won numerous accolades. He has published broadly in the field of Creative Writing, and is a regular reviewer of contemporary poetry.

JAY RUBIN

Jay Rubin holds his Ph.D. in Japanese literature from the University of Chicago. He has taught at Harvard University and the University of Washington. Rubin has translated most of the work of renowned Japanese author Haruki Murakami and has also translated Natsume Soseki and Noh drama. His most recent publications are Modern Japanese Writers (Scribners, 2001), and Haruki Murakami and the Music of Words (Harvill, 2002; Vintage, 2005). His translation of 18 stories by Akutagawa Ryunosuke appeared as a Penguin Classic in 2006.





JONATHAN DUNNE

Jonathan Dunne was educated at Oxford University and holds advanced diplomas in Spanish, Galician and Bulgarian. His many translations include: from the Spanish, two novels by Enrique Vila-Matas, *Bartleby & Co* and *Montano's Malady*, nominated for the 2008 Independent Foreign Fiction Prize; from the Galician, *In the Wilderness*, nominated for the

2004 Weidenfeld Translation Prize, and *The Carpenter's Pencil*, nominated for the 2003 International IMPAC Award, both by Manuel Rivas. He is the author of *The DNA of the English Language* (2007) and a collection of poetry entitled *Even Though That* (2004). He lives in Sofia, Bulgaria.

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

The title of the book comes from an essay by Oscar Wilde in which the search for a thoroughly good blue is a metaphor for the writer's search for perfection.

BRIAN TURNER

Brian Turner served for seven years in the US Army. He was an infantry team leader for a year in Iraq from November 2003 with the 3rd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division. In 1999-2000 he was deployed to Bosnia-Herzegovina with the 10th Mountain Division. Born in 1967, he received an MFA from the University of Oregon and lived abroad in South Korea for a year before joining the army. His poetry was included in the Voices in Wartime Anthology published in conjunction with a feature-length documentary film. His collection Here, Bullet

(Bloodaxe Books, 2007) was first published in the US by Alice James Books in 2005, where it has earned Turner nine major literary awards, including a 2006 Lannan Literary Fellowship and a 2007 NEA Literature Fellowship in Poetry. In 2009 he was given an Amy Lowell Traveling Fellowship. His second collection, *Phantom Noise* was shortlisted for the 2010 TS Eliot Prize.





JACOB SAM-LA ROSE

Jacob Sam-La Rose was born in London in 1976. He was Managing Director of a web development studio before becoming a freelance writer and editor. He is the Artistic Director of the London Teenage Poetry Slam and an editor for Flipped Eye Press. He also facilitates a range of literature-in-education, creative writing and spoken word programmes through schools, arts centres and other institutions. His work has appeared in many anthologies and journals, including *Identity Parade: New British & Irish Poets* (Bloodaxe), *Poems For Love* (Penguin), *I Have Found a Song* (Enitharmon Press), *Red* (Peepal Tree), *Learn Then Burn: The Ultimate Poetry Guide for the High School or College Classroom* (Write Bloody) and Michael Rosen's A-Z: The Best Children's Poetry from Agard to Zephaniah (Puffin). His pamphlet Communion was a Poetry Book Society Pamphlet Choice in 2006. *Breaking Silence* (Bloodaxe Books, 2011) is his first book-length collection.

DAVID MITCHELL

David Mitchell was born in Southport, Merseyside in 1969 and grew up in Malvern, Worcestershire. A graduate of the University of Kent, he studied for a degree in English and American Literature, followed by an MA in Comparative Literature. After university David travelled and taught English in Japan for eight years. His first novel: Ghostwritten (1999), won the Mail on Sunday/John Llewellyn Rhys Prize for the best book by a writer under 35 and was also shortlisted for the Guardian First Book Award, His second novel, number9dream was shortlisted for the 2001 Man Booker Prize as well as the James Tait Black Memorial Prize.

His best selling novel *Cloud Atlas*, (now being made into a Hollywood movie directed by the Wachowski Brothers) was shortlisted for the 2004 Man Booker Prize and won the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize and the South Bank Show Literature Prize. His most recent book: *The Thousand Autumns of Jacob de Zoet* (2010), was longlisted for the 2010 Man Booker Prize and was listed as one of Time Magazine's Best Books of the Year and a New York Times Notable Book of the Year. David Mitchell lives in Clonakilty, Ireland with his wife and their two children.

SIMON VAN BOOY

Simon Van Booy was born in Great Britain and grew up in rural Wales. He is the author of *The Secret Lives* of *People in Love, Love Begins in Winter* (winner of the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Award) and the novel, *Everything Beautiful Began After.* He is the editor of three philosophy books, titled *Why We Fight*, *Why We Need Love*, and *Why Our Decisions Don't Matter.* His essays have appeared in *The New York*



Times, The Daily Telegraph, The Times, The Guardian, and ELLE Men, (China), where he has a monthly column. He has also written for National Public Radio and the BBC. His first play, HINDSIGHT, is currently in production for a New York City run in March, 2012. He teaches at the School of Visual Arts in Manhattan, and is involved in the Rutgers Early College Humanities program for young adults living in underserved communities. He was a finalist for the Vilcek Prize for Creative Promise, and his work has been translated into thirteen languages. His latest novel, *The Illusion of Separateness* will be released in the autumn of 2012.

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BRIAN BOURKE Pertaining to William Blake At Norman Villa Gallery

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This body of work has been specifically created for the Cúirt Festival by the renowned artist Brian Bourke. Bourke who has a deep love of literature in particular poetry is fascinated by the poetic and artistic works of William Blake.

The exhibition consists of still life paintings of the life-mask of William Blake with decaying sunflowers and a series of works derived from Blake's painting "The Ghost of a Flea".

CÚIRT TOUR OF GALWAY'S POETRY AND PROSE PLAQUES

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MEETING POINT / START: The historic 19th century Quadrangle building at the National University of Ireland, Galway, which first opened its doors to 63 students on 30th October 1849.

2. The first plaque on the tour presents 'Uncle Philip' by the renowned English poet Roger McGough, and features illustrations by Tom Matthews. It is located in the Children's Millennium Playground on the wall by the end of the entrance ramp.

3. Enjoy a leisurely stroll along the canal to where Moya Cannon's 'Bright City' can be found on the Claddagh side of Wolfe Tone Bridge. Some of the swans mentioned in the poem might be encountered on your way to the next stop.

4. A plaque dedicated to Louis McNeice, featuring his poem 'Galway,' is impressively located at the end of Nimmo's Pier. Louis wrote this poem on the pier in 1939 after hearing the news of the beginning of World War II.

5. Also situated in the Claddagh area is an extract from Walter Macken's *The Rain on the Wind*. This plaque was unveiled during Cúirt 2007 to mark the 40th anniversary of the Galway writer's passing.

6. From Nimmo's Pier the tour takes in the beautiful seaside sights and sounds of the Long Walk and the Salthill Promenade. Seamus Heaney's 'Girls Bathing, Galway, 1965' is located by Ladies' Beach across the road from the Galway Bay Hotel.

7. Just a short walk further down the promenade will bring you to the final stop on the tour. Across the path from the yellow swimmer's shelter is a plaque featuring 'Fear na Lasraí', or, 'The Lamplighter', by Máirtín O'Direáin, who was once known as Ireland's unofficial 'Poet Laureate'.


