




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




WRITERS' WOODLAND AT TERRYLAND FOREST PARK

Galway's Terryland Forest Park was the largest urban neighbourhood forest project in Ireland when planting commenced in January 2000 with 120 acres zoned by Galway City Council for a new woodland and riverine park. Since then over 100,000 native Irish trees have been planted by the people and schools of Galway, creating an expansive natural habitat for a wide variety of flora and fauna. Cúirt initiated a Writers' Woodland in the forest park in 2013 and now, as part of the annual Cúirt festival, visiting writers plant trees in Terryland, adding new leaves to the festival narrative.

READ ME, I'M YOURS

Each year a number of copies of visiting authors books are dropped in various locations around Galway city where people can pick them up and read them. Each book has a flyer inside that gives the date and time of the authors' reading so that those intrigued by what they read can then go along to the event. This year books will be left at cafés, pubs and hotel foyers in the months of March and April.





KITCHEN READINGS

For the past five years, Cúirt in association with the Galway Library Service have hosted Kitchen Readings. These are informal gatherings of poets and musicians in homes across Galway, offering an intimate and fun experience to neighbours and friends. This year the Rape Crisis Centre in Galway City will also be hosting a Kitchen Reading. Participating in the kitchen readings this year will be: Aindrias de Staic and Clare Murphy.

ONE BOOK ONE GALWAY

The 2015 One Book One Galway is Gary Paulsen's Hatchet, published in 1987. It is the first novel of five in the Hatchet series. The novel explores the themes of survival and endurance and what it means to be human, all through the eyes of the main character, 13 year old Brian Robeson.

The project is run by the Home School community liaison service from Galway City schools and the Galway City Library service and will see over 500 children from both primary and post-primary schools in Galway taking part this year. The aim of One Book is to bring children together for a community wide reading experience to help develop appreciation for reading as the gateway that makes all other learning possible.

PLAQUE UNVFII INGS

For a number of years Cúirt has unveiled plaques around Galway at different locations linked to writing about Galway. The prose and poetry collections cast onto bronze or carved into stone, are on display through out the city providing a literary trail for locals and visitors. Each plaque is made possible with the support of Galway City Council in conjunction with Kenny's Bookshop. This year two plaques will be added to the collection:

The first, Margadh by Máire Holmes, will be unveiled on Tuesday April 19th at 4pm outside Geraghty's on Lombard Street.

The second, Galway Bay by Arthur Colohan, (with an Irish translation and a French translation by Joseph Gilmartin) will be unveiled on the promenade directly opposite the aquarium on Wednesday April 20th at 1pm.

This year Cúirt will be introducing an Artist in Residence, a Storyteller in Residence and a Musician in Residence who will be performing in various venues throughout the festival.

CLARE MUIREANN MURPHY (STORYTELLER IN RESIDENCE)

Performer, writer and curiosist, Clare celebrates her tenth year this year storytelling. Originally from Dublin, Clare has lived in America, Spain and now London. She has performed the world over from Brazil to Oslo. She has frequented great stages such as The Globe Theatre, The National Theatre and Soho Theatre in London, as well as touring

once a year around the US.



Clare is a deftly physical performer, playing with her typical wit and verve in the space between audience and story.



Aindrias de Staic is a much-loved TV presenter, Comic Actor, Film-maker & Storyteller but he is first and foremost a musician.

Since completing his MA (Hons) in Community Music in University Limerick he has taught, toured and jammed with a variety of musicians & musical styles in a variety of projects across the globe. He has scored music for Award winning films and he features regularly on screen and stage internationally.

Wildly original, worldly, enthralling and slightly enigmatic, Aindrias is a captivating and diverse performer who will leave audiences amused and confused, delighted and bewildered and creatively fuelled with his explosive, infectious energy. Drawing on the history and mystery of life in the West of Ireland Aindrias continues to perform with a Wild Atlantic Wallop of energy, wit and passion.

ED HODGKINSON (ARTIST IN RESIDENCE)

Ed Hodgkinson currently lives and works in London. He has exhibited widely, both in London and internationally, showing in New York, LA, Tokyo, Cape Town, Stockholm, Hong Kong and Reykjavik. He studied at Camberwell College of Art and is represented by galleries in London and Cape Town. Hodgkinson is a painter whose work is fundamentally concerned with drawing. Working from life, he takes the qualities found in line drawing - spontaneity, simplicity, abbreviation & experiment, and incorporates them directly into his painting. The drawn line acting as stream of consciousness... or as Erika Naginski descibes it '...an activity that exemplifies an imagination in flux'.

WHAT FOREMOTHERS?

In 1992, Irish poet Nuala Ni Dhomhnaill asked this question in response to the suggestion that female Irish poets have "a long healthy chain of foremothers" available to them. She could well have been forgiven for doing so, as the project of nation-building in the early days of the Irish State played a huge role in the construction of a male-dominated literary canon. It is only in recent years that the erasure and cultural depreciation of female voices has begun to be redressed. A whole segment of poetic lineage that our culture could be drawing on has been wiped out.

This ensemble performance deals with a group of female poets writing in the early decades of the Irish State. It gives voice to experiences that have long been stifled, and questions what a canon is - a pantheon of literary treasures judged solely by artistic merit? Or a sustained political project that marches the idea of 'nationhood' forward? What has been lost? And more importantly, why?

Directed by Sarah O'Toole and produced in tandem with #wakingthefeministswest, a student-led theatre initiative supported by NUI Galway's Centre for Drama, Theatre and Performance.


FÍS NA FUISEOIGE

TASTE WHAT'S GOING ON LIVE AT THE ISLE OF WIGHT FESTIVAL 1970

This film tells the story of Ireland's seminal rock band Taste, formed in Cork in 1966 by Rory Gallagher. Taste had a brief but influential career, releasing two studio albums in 1969 and 1970 and disbanding shortly after their legendary appearance at the 1970 Isle of Wight Festival, which is the centrepiece of this film. The core of "What's Going On" is the band's performance at the festival on August 28th but it is encapsulated by a documentary on the history and importance of Taste, featuring contributions from Rory's brother and Taste road manager Donal Gallagher, Brian May (Queen), The Edge (U2), Bob Geldof and renowned guitarist Larry Coryell.

There will be an interview and Q&A with Dónal Gallagher after the film viewing.








TRACY BRUEN

Tracy Bruen, Galway Advertiser's solo artist of the year 2015, has been writing and gigging her original music since 2013. She has played electric picnic, Body and Soul and Killarney-Festival and supported or shared the stage with such artists as the West Cork Ukulele Orchestra and Mick Flannery. Her EP, "Play Outside the Lines" was released to critical acclaim in 2014 and she and her band are currently recording their debut album.

Johnny Duhan started his career as a fifteen year old front man with Granny's Intentions, the most popular beat group in Ireland in the 60s. After rousing Dublin with their soul touch, they moved to London, were signed to the prestigious Deram label, enjoyed considerable success and then disbanded. Johnny started writing folk songs, poetry and prose. In a career spanning 50 years, his greatest achievement is a quartet of epic albums - Just Another Town, To The Light, The Voyage and Flame - which correspond to the four chapters of his lyrical autobiography, To The Light. Johnny's songs are sung worldwide in a variety of languages, thanks to the focus put on them by Christy Moore, The Dubliners, Mary Black and hosts of other Irish and international singers. His song The Voyage has become a modern classic. Christy Moore has termed Johnny "One of our greatest songwriters." And the late Ronnie Drew described him as "one of my favourite songwriters."

"Davy Carton and Leo Moran have a sharp eye for mixed emotions and lyric detail, which they marry to bouncy melodies. They lionize Ireland's "N17" in much the same way Bobby Troup once celebrated America's "Route 66", but Carton and Moran are smart enough to balance the romance of the road with an acknowledgement of the price it demands.

Declan Meade is publisher and founding editor of *The Stinging Fly* magazine and Editor and Publisher with Stinging Fly Press. Since 2005 he has published debut short story collections by Kevin Barry, Michael J. Farrell, Mary Costello, Colin Barrett, Claire-Louise Bennett, Danielle McLaughlin and he has edited a number of anthologies, including *These Are Our Lives, Let's Be Alone Together* and *Davy Byrnes Stories*.

In this two-hour session, Declan will talk about his experiences as an editor and publisher with a focus on the editorial process. He will answer questions about what writers need to consider before submitting work for publication and what happens during the move from manuscript to published story or book.

Her first collection Short Haul Engine came out in 2011, and was awarded the Dorothy Livesay Poetry Prize. In 2005 she published Modern and Normal, which was shortlisted for the Trillium Book Award for Poetry. Pigeon, published by Anansi in 2009, won her the Canadian Griffin Poetry Prize, Pat Lowther Award and Trillium Book Award for Poetry. Her poems have been published across Canada, in the US, UK, and Europe, and have been translated into French, German, Korean and Dutch. The Living Option: Selected Poems, was published by Bloodaxe Books in 2013—new poems in the Bloodaxe UK edition have been published in Canada in The Road In Is Not The Same Road Out (Anansi, 2015). Karen Solie is Associate Director for the Banff Centre's Writing Studio program in Banff, Alberta.

HISTORY WARS: POLITICS IN AMERICAN CHILDREN'S BOOKS

Siobhán Parkinson

Siobhán Parkinson has been writing for children and teenagers for more than twenty years and has published dozens of books, the best known of which is Sisters — No Way! Her most recent books for teenagers are Bruised and Heart-Shaped.

She was Ireland's first Laureate for Children's Literature (2010-12) and is also a translator, editor and publisher. She lived in Loughrea, where she has family connections, as a child, and for one year in Galway city, where she attended Scoil Íde.

Patricia Forde

Patricia Forde lives in Galway. She has written many books and television programmes for children and young people in Irish and in English. Her first novel, The Wordsmith, was published in May 2015 to wide critical acclaim and won a White Raven award from the International Youth Library. She has worked as a writer on both English and Irish language soap operas. In another life, she was a primary school teacher and the artistic director of Galway Arts Festival. In her spare time, she collects vintage children's books and reads them late at night.

The Galway Youth Arts Alliance is a youth-led non-profit arts organisation for secondary level students in Galway.



Each year Cúirt Labs engages children and young people from Galway City and County in various workshops, talks, readings and debates with artists from all disciplines. This year artist Shona Shirley MacDonald has transformed **Galway Arts Centre into** a midnight circus where children and teenagers will meet writers, a musician and some circus performers. Cúirt Labs will also make a trip to **Furbo National School where** storyteller Clare Muireann Murphy will take over a class for the morning.

Shona Shirley MacDonald

Shona Shirley MacDonald is an artist originally from Aberdeen, Scotland, though currently based in Co. Waterford, Ireland. She studied Visual Communication at Edinburgh College of Art where she specialised in stop-motion animation. She currently works as an illustrator and past projects include illustration for comics, poetry, short stories, murals, textile design and concept art. She has had solo shows in the Roe Valley Arts and Cultural Centre in Limavady in August 2014 and the Riverbank Arts Centre, Kildare, 2016. She is a member of the Illustrators Guild of Ireland.

Aistear @ Cúirt Labs

This year Cúirt Labs is working with Junior and Senior Infants from Scoil Chroí Íosa in Galway City who are currently participating the Aistear programme. Aistear is an early years programme that assists children in becoming competent and confident learners. Participants focus on real-world scenarios and using different play strategies explore language, identity, belonging and well-being. Cúirt Labs has worked with Scoil Chroí Íosa on the theme 'A Visit to a Book Festival'. The three week project culminates in a trip to Cúirt Labs to meet a writer.

Juno's titles have received rave reviews and have been translated into more than ten languages around the world.

Galway Community Circus is Ireland's first dedicated youth circus. They are a charitable organisation built on fun, innovation, and a commitment to inspiring and empowering people through circus arts. Since 2002, GCC has been at the forefront of teaching circus skills to young people; helping them to discover and develop their talents, and in some cases, laying the foundation for a lifelong vocation.

Joan McBreen is from Sligo. She divides her time between Tuam and Renvyle, County Galway. Her publications include: The Wind Beyond the Wall, A Walled Garden in Moylough and Winter in the Eye – New and Selected Poems, The White Page / An Bhileog Bhán – Twentieth-Century Irish Women Poets (Editor), Heather Island, and the anthology The Watchful Heart – A New Generation of Irish Poets – Poems and Essays. She is a member of the Board of Poetry Ireland.

Afric McGlinchey grew up in Ireland and Africa. Her work has received a Hennessy Poetry Award, the Northern Liberties Poetry Prize and was selected for the 2014 Italo-Irish Literature Exchange and a Faber Academy Fellowship. Afric's début, *The Lucky Star of Hidden Things* (2012), was translated into Italian. Published earlier this year, *Ghost of the Fisher Cat* is her second collection from Salmon.

This is a live staging of the radio musical complete with narrator, an ensemble of actors, a six piece band backing singers and lots and lots of live sound effects. It explores the idea of a radio musical as a theatrical event because what you see and what you hear can be very different things.

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Leabhar Na hAthghabhála (Poems of Repossession), edited by Irish-language poet and scholar Louis de Poar, is the first comprehensive and critical anthology of modern poetry in Irish with translations to English. It is a sequel to Seán Ó Tuama and Thomas Kinsella's pioneering anthology, An Duanaire 1600-1900 (Poems of the Dispossessed). Leabhar Na hAthghabhála continues the 1981 anthology's feat by featuring many more poems that cover the work of twenty-six poets from the past century.

In this new anthology, there are poems by Pádraig Mac Piarais and Liam S. Gógan from the revival period (1893-1939); a generous selection from the work of Máirtín Ó Direáin, Seán Ó Ríordáin and Máire Mhac an tSaoi who transformed writing in Irish in the decades following the Second World War; and the Innti poets - Michael Davitt, Liam Ó Muirthile, Nuala Ní Dhomhnaill, Cathal Ó Searcaigh, Biddy Jenkinson—and others who developed new possibilities for poetry in Irish in the 1970s and 80s. More recent poetry in Irish is represented by the work of poets such as Colm Breathnach, Gearóid Mac Lochlainn, Micheál Ó Cuaig and Áine Ní Ghlinn. Translations to English complement the Irish, with some coming from Ireland's most distinguished poets and translators including Valentine Iremonger, Michael Hartnett, Paul Muldoon, Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin, Bernard O'Donoghue, Maurice Riordan, Peter Sirr, David Wheatley and Mary O'Donoghue. Many translations of the poems—some commissioned for this ground-breaking anthology— have not previously been available in English, including Eoghan Ó Tuairisc's anguished response to the bombing of Hiroshima, 'Aifreann na Marbh' (Mass for the Dead).

In his introduction, Louis de Paor argues that Irish language poetry should be evaluated according to its own rigorous aesthetic rather than as a subsidiary of the dominant Anglophone tradition of Irish writing.



Robert Pinsky's work has earned praise for its graceful and strong style, musicality, diversity and range. "Deciding to remember, and what to remember," Pinsky has written, "is how we decide who we are." Pinsky has published poetry collections for over 40 years, starting with Sadness and Happiness in 1975. The Figured Wheel: New and Collected Poems 1966-1996 was a Pulitzer Prize finalist. He is also the author of several prose titles including: The Life of David; Democracy, Culture, and the Voice of Poetry (2002); The Sounds of Poetry (1998), and Poetry and the World (1988).




Throughout his career, Pinsky has been a vehement advocate for the (re)placing of poetry amongst all its people in innovative ways. As U.S. Poet Laureate, he founded the Favourite Poem Project in which thousands of Americans shared their favourite poem. Its legacy, an anthology *Americans' Favorite Poems* is in its 18th printing. Pinsky has won several prizes including the PEN/Voelcker Award and William Carlos Williams Prize. In 2015, Boston University named him a William Fairfield Warren Distinguished Professor—the highest honour bestowed on senior faculty members actively involved in scholarship, University civic life, and teaching.

Natasha Trethewey—19th U.S. Poet Laureate and Pulitzer Prize Winner—explores what it is to be citizen, to be dweller, to be human, to be considered 'of' and/or 'not of' a place, to be liminal among the norms of identity. Librarian of Congress James Billington wrote, "Her poems dig beneath the surface of history—personal or communal, from childhood or from a century ago—to explore the human struggles that we all face." She is the author of Domestic Work (2000), Bellocq's Ophelia (2002), Native Guard (2006) and Thrall (2012). Her poems have appeared in many journals and anthologies such as American Poetry Review, The Southern Review, New England Review, and several volumes of Best American Poetry. Trethewey's honours include fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts. She is Robert W. Woodruff Professor of English and Creative Writing at Emory University.



Petina Gappah is a Zimbabwean writer with law degrees from Cambridge, Graz University and the University of Zimbabwe. Her debut story collection, An Elegy for Easterly, won The Guardian First Book Prize in 2009. The Book of Memory was published by Faber and Faber in September 2015.



Poems for Patience is a long-running programme stablished by Galway University Hospitals Arts Trust which poems are displayed on the Arts Corridor of the hospital and also displayed in waiting areas throughout the hospital and associated hospital units.

In the past, the series has featured poems by leading Irish and international poets such as Seamus Heaney, Philip Schultz, Michael Longley, Vona Groarke, Jane Hirschfield and Tess Gallagher. This year's selection has been kindly chosen by Colette Bryce, and includes the winning poem of the GUH Arts Trust annual poetry competition, judged by Kevin Higgins.

Colette Bryce was born in Derry in 1970. She was a Creative Writing Fellow at the University of Dundee (2003-05) and held the North East Literary Fellowship in Newcastle from 2005-07. Selfportrait in the Dark, her third collection from Picador, was published in 2008. Colette was awarded a special prize in memory of Seamus Heaney as part of the the 2015 Christopher Ewart-Biggs Prize for her collection The Whole and Rain-domed Universe.

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KIRSTY LOGAN& **JOANNA WALSH**

The tradition of telling a tale, the passing-down of it to others with iterative moral insight, the making of lore, intricacies of coded messages and their implications—are re-imagined in Kirsty Logan and Joanna Walsh's work. Both authors explore through precise--and sometimes telegram-like prose--life's geometry that can eerily broadcast itself from objects, structures, and bodies and take to and from our relationship with our being, and greater movement through emotional iourneys such as grief, uncertainty and loneliness.



I gcuideachta Thaidhg beidh beirt de na fonnadóirí sean-nóis is aitheanta i gConamara - Caitlín Ní Chualáin as Indreabhán, agus as Carna aniar, Amhránaí na Bliana TG4, Pól Ó Ceannabháin.

One of the best-known lyrics in the Irish language is the apparently autobiographical 'Mise Raifteirí an File', describing a poet full of hope and love, with eyes without light, with silence without torment. Now believed to have been written in America by an emigrant language enthusiast, the poem has promoted an image of the early 19th century Antaine Ó Reachtabhra that is far from the truth. A fearless, tempestuous, passionate figure, Raiftearaí's tender love songs are still sung to this day in the sean-nós song repertoire of Conamara. Less known are his political songs, his religious verse, his humorous poems or his epic history of Ireland in rhyme. His work was collected and edited by Douglas Hyde, revered by Lady Gregory, studied by WB Yeats and name-checked in Joyce's Ulysses.

Weaving song, story, commentary and atmospheric film elements, Tadhg Mac Dhonnagáin, whose biography of the poet, Mise Raiftearaí an Fíodóir Focal was awarded Gradam Uí Shúilleabháin, Irish-language book of the year award for 2015 presents this evening of the life, times and words of Raiftearaí, He is joined by award-winning Conamara sean-nós singers, Caitlín Ní Chualáin and TG4 Traditional Singer of the Year 2016, Pól Ó Ceannabháin.



Throw in the Vowels was reissued in 2010 with an audio CD of her reading her poems. Her new collection, Tongulish, has just been published by Bloodaxe.



Colette Bryce was born in Derry in 1970. She was a Creative Writing Fellow at the University of Dundee (2003-05) and held the North East Literary Fellowship in Newcastle from 2005-07. She divides her time between London and Newcastle upon Tyne, working as a freelance teacher, and editor at Poetry London. Colette won The Eric Gregory Award in 1995, and published her first collection, The Heel of Bernadette, in 2000. She won the National Poetry Competition in 2003 with 'The Full Indian Rope Trick', which was voted a favourite poem in a poll to celebrate 30 years of the National Poetry Competition - it became the title poem of her second collection, The Full Indian Rope Trick (2004). Self-portrait in the Dark, her third collection from Picador, was published in 2008. Colette was awarded a special prize in memory of Seamus Heaney as part of the the 2015 Christopher Ewart-Biggs Prize for her collection The Whole and Raindomed Universe.






